Reds Probe For Weak Spots On 120-Mile Front

Powerful Hurricane Hits Gulf Coast

NEW ORLEANS, Aug. 30 (AP)—A powerful Gulf hurricane, the first to strike the United States coastline this year, slammed Santa Rosa Island, Fla., at 6:30 P.M. E.T. today.

It will smash at the Mississippi-Alabama coastline "within the next few hours," W.R. Stevens, chief forecaster of the New Orleans Weather Bureau, said in reporting the hurricane's strike.

Main Enemy Pressure On Northern Sector

TOKYO, Aug. 31—(Thursday)—(AP)—Close-quarter action flared all along the Korean war front Wednesday with Allied troops jabbing at increasingly large North Korean forces trying to cleave the United Nations beachhead.

Dispatches from the Pohang front called the situation inconclusive and still worrisome. The Reds searched all along the 120-mile-long battle front for a weak spot.

Heavy Red Pressure

The main Red pressure was brought to bear on the northern front, where the lines run roughly 55 miles inland from Pohang on the east coast to Waegwan, 12 miles northwest of Taegu.

Battle For Hill
Still farther west, about 16 miles northwest of Taegu, U. S. forces stormed up a strategic hill four miles northeast of Waegwan in the face of withering machine-gun, mortar and small-arms fire.

U. N. To Decide Aim Of Campaign

WASHINGTON, Aug. 30—(AP)—State Secretary Dean Acheson said today it is up to the United Nations to decide whether its forces should drive beyond the 38th parallel which divided North and South Korea.

Borden Train First To Operate

The Borden train will roll out of Charlottetown this morning at seven o'clock on the first regular train since before the rail strike commenced.

About the time the hurricane struck Santa Rosa Island, a tornado—probably an offshoot of the hurricane—hit Apalachicola, Fla. The Florida highway patrol said 10 or 12 houses were destroyed but there were no reports of deaths or injuries.

Rush Preparations

Full-scale preparations were rushed to minimize damage from the winds and dangerous high tides. Vaca-tioners fled Mississippi coast hotels.

The L. and N. Railroad sent a "last chance" special train out to bring in workers and residents. Extra crews were brought in to keep clear the roadbed that carried the main commuter trains from Pascagoula, Miss., to New Orleans.
