



MEMORIAL BUILDING PLANS DISCUSSED

Governor-General George Vanier and Mrs. Vanier discuss the prizewinning model of the Fathers of Confederation Memorial Building with Dr. Frank MacKinnon. At the time they were attending a dinner of the Memorial Citizens' Foundation held at the Chateau Laurier in Ottawa on Tuesday night.

14 Below Is Recorded

The coldest day this winter was experienced by Charlottetown residents yesterday as temperatures dropped to 14 below zero between 7 a.m. and 8 a.m.

However, yesterday's low temperature is still not as low as was experienced last winter. During a similar cold spell last year a reading of 16 below zero was recorded on Jan. 24.

The highest the mercury reached yesterday was two above between 3 p.m. and 4 p.m.

The temperature at 12.30 a.m. this morning was being recorded by the Charlottetown radio range at 2 below zero.

Contract Let For Scows

A \$179,800 contract has been awarded by the Department of Public Works to the Ocean Steel and Construction Limited of Lancaster, N.B., for the construction and delivery of two 300 cubic yard hopper dump scows for the Department of Public Works in the Maritime Provinces. This was announced in Ottawa by Hon. David J. Walker, minister of public works.

Each scow will be 100 feet long, with a moulded beam of 22 feet, and a moulded depth of nine feet, six inches. Each will be equipped with four hoppers, 15 feet long by 18 feet wide at the top and eight feet wide at the bottom. The vessels will be of welded construction.

One of the scows will be stationed at St. John's, Nfld., and will operate with the Department's Dredge No. 22, while the other will be based at Charlottetown, P.E.I., and operate with Dredge No. 20.

Island Student At Wisconsin

Charles G. Rogers, Charlottetown, is among the approximately 1,800 foreign students from 75 countries and six continents who are studying at the University of Wisconsin in Madison, U.S.A., this year along with about 19,225 American students from all of the 50 states of the United States and the U.S. Territories of Puerto Rico, the Virgin Islands, and the Western Caroline Islands.

About one out of every 20 students studying at Wisconsin this year is from a foreign nation. A total of about 800 of the foreign students are enrolled in advanced graduate studies in the University's Graduate School, with the remaining 200 foreign students enrolled in undergraduate studies.

Sewerage Installation Opens Areas

Reporting the building of more than 12 miles of sewers, interceptor and outfall since the inception of its sewer program in 1953, Councillor J. Edmond Arsenault, chairman of the water and sewerage liaison committee told the annual meeting of City Council Wednesday that the accomplishment had made available many acres of land for development of residential sections.

Mr. Arsenault reminded Council that while extensions of these facilities entailed major capital expenditures the investments were necessary to foster continued growth of the city and provide essential services to citizens.

The committee chairman reported that by agreement with the Co-op Housing group building in the northwest section of the city the installation of sewers would be delayed until this coming spring. In the meantime the sewer pipe has been ordered for winter delivery. However, he noted the installation of water services for the sub-division had been completed.

Presbytery Approves New Morell UC Plans

Work will begin on a new United Church at Morell as soon as financial arrangements have been completed, it was decided at a recent meeting of the Presbytery of Prince Edward Island of the United Church.

Approval was given to the Mount Stewart - St. Peter's Bay pastoral charge to erect the new building and also to the plans and area.

The report on pastoral relations was given by Rev. Robert Latimer and it was agreed to declare a vacancy for an assistant minister in the congregation of Trinity United Church, Summerside, to assist the pastor Rev. C.R. Webber. Recent expansion in the town increased the work at the church with the result that it is now necessary to take this step, it was noted.

Rev. W.B. Creed gave the report for the missionary and maintenance fund and observed that the same return as a year ago was evident. He pointed out that gains in some charges were offset by decreases in others. This was largely attributed, he said, to the large number of vacant charges in the island, some with irregular services. The presbytery unanimously agreed to a 10 per cent increase

A report was given by Rev. David MacDonald on his recent attendance at the World Council of Churches held in New Delhi, India.

Rev. Milton Fraser, superintendent of home missions addressed the assembly and spoke of the great need to meet the terrific shortage of ministers. It was noted that the United Church in the Maritimes now was short 35 ministers, who, if available, could be placed immediately.

He urged ministers to be concerned about this problem and make this year one of challenge to young people to accept full-time church work.
