First it was a scoreless draw with Mount Allison, then a 3-0 win over Halifax Wanderers, next a scoreless draw with the Mariners a week ago and finally the 5-0 victory on Saturday.

But the Abbies offensive power, although it has not resulted in any large scores, has so far outdone their tackling displays. The local team's half line gave a smoother exhibition here Saturday than at any time during the season. Picking quarter Johnny Bradley, and flying quarter Elmer Blanchard, who worked together for two years at S. D. U., fitted together again like a hand and glove. "Red" Howatt played the best game of football he ever took part in, while players like George Scantlebury and Howard Glover always give a good performance. "Spic" Coyle saved the day with his tackling while "Windy" LePage showed he has not forgotten any of his football know-how.

The forward line of Reg Rodgers, Ebbie Devine and Noel Wilson is very probably the best in the Maritimes. Wilson and Devine are both low set, heavy shouldered men while Rodgers is a medium sized heeler. 235 pound Ray Sark and Charlie Ready supply plenty of power in their positions as locks while Bill Ledwell is a speedy tail-up man who can be used with the forwards or in the backfield. Backing the team up is the capable Art Perry, the big fullback, who aggravated an old knee injury Saturday that may keep him sidelined for the rest of the season. Altogether the Abbies have 23 players and they had a number on the sidelines Saturday who would be an asset to any team.

For the players and the coaches the win must have been doubly sweet. Back in the early part of September they banded together for their first practices with only about 10 men showing up. They had a good team on paper said the critics if they could get them out to practise. But where there's a will there's a way and the Abbies found the way. They instituted early morning practices.
