**A PRO-AMERICAN POLICY.**

Both in Canada and the United Kingdom the trade of the United States has made great annual strides in the last four years.

The exports to Canada, according to the American trade returns, have been as follows:—

1896	\$59,687,821
1897	64,928,821
1898	83,716,086
1899	87,974,961
1900	95,084,248

To the United Kingdom the exports have mounted up on the following scale:—

1896	\$405,741,339
1897	483,270,498
1898	540,940,605
1899	511,778,705
1900	533,829,374

While our competitors have been gaining ground at this extraordinary pace in our home market and in the market of the Mother Country, the following is the humble record of our sales in the United States market:—

1896	\$40,887,565
1897	40,309,371
1898	31,870,486
1899	31,220,977
1900	39,304,502

Thus in the last four years the United States has sold to Britain \$446,833,726 more than it would have sold had the average of its sales been just equal to the sales in 1896.

To Canada in the same period the United States has sold \$92,952,832 worth more of goods than it would have sold had its average yearly sales been just equal to the sales of 1896.

That is, in the British market it has gained \$446,833,726 in the four years and in the Canadian market \$92,952,832.

In the meantime Canada's sales to the United States in that time have not averaged as high as the figure of 1896, and fall short by \$20,344,922 of doing so.

But how, asks the Mail and Empire, could we expect a better comparative showing seeing that the United States tariff was increased against us, that the Canadian tariff was lowered in favor of the United States, and that Sir Wilfrid Laurier opposed a British Customs tax on United States foodstuffs in the interests of Canada?

**MR. LYNCH'S CHARGES.**

Mr. W. H. Lynch was appointed by the government two years ago to go to the Yukon to report on the trade of the country. He was then and is now a strong liberl. But, as the St. John Sun remarks, he is a man with a conscience and some public spirit, and the government has refused to act upon or even consider the information which he obtained. The result is that Mr. Lynch has taken the platform to discuss these matters and since he is not allowed to speak at government meetings, he has spoken once in Montreal and once in Richmond county at Conservative meetings. Speaking at Richmond, Mr. Lynch said:

"The condition of affairs in Dawson City at the time when Sir

Hubert Tupper made his charges of official corruption in Parliament was nothing less than a disgrace to the good name of Canada. Though it was not his duty to make an investigation of the charges against officials of the government, he had been thrown in close contact not with the officials, but with the miners.

"I had no hesitation in stating that there existed among the officials a system of corruption and connivance at wrong-doing, which amply justified Mr. Ogilvie in saying in his report that no more was thought of a man perjuring himself in Dawson than of saluting a friend on the street. It was not the royalty of ten per cent. on the gross output that the miners objected to so much as it was the blackmail levied upon them—and yet Mr. Ogilvie was unable to do anything to alter this state of affairs, and in his report admitted that he had not been able to secure evidence against wrong-doers. This was the crux of the charges made by Sir Hubert Tupper."

Mr. Lynch went on to say that when the miners complained to him he told them that the ministers did not know of these facts, for they were honest men, desiring to govern the country well, and would not tolerate these offences for an instant.

"I assured the miners that I would go back to Ottawa and make a report, which would show the government the real state of affairs, and suggest a way in which that condition of affairs could be improved. I gave my word that I would tell the truth about the wrongs which were being done. I could have made money by recommending that the royalty be reduced in order that the miners should be satisfied, but I knew that it was not the royalty which was complained of, but the corruption which existed incident to the working of the regulations. I returned to Ottawa, made a true report as to the condition of affairs and suggested the remedy. I fulfilled my pledge to the miners, but how was I treated? My report, which, if the Government had acted upon, would have corrected the abuses complained of, was suppressed."

"\* \* And it was simply amazing to see the way in which evidence of the condition of affairs was suppressed. Even members of parliament who visited the country talked big in Dawson of what they intended saying about the disgraceful condition of affairs which existed when they returned home. At Vancouver they hedged, and by the time they reached Ottawa they were dumb. This was Clifford Sifton's work. He was determined the public should not know the true state of affairs. Thank God, he was not able to shut my mouth."

The speaker had been told by a member of the government that it had been the intention of the government to grant a full and searching enquiry into the charges made by Sir Hubert Tupper, but that Mr. Sifton had refused to allow it.
