"We are daily awaiting release," said Maj.-Gen. Haruo Fukuchi, who was on the Japanese army staff at Hong Kong.

I.O.D.E. Will Receive Scholarship Application

Mrs. Thane A. Campbell, provincial educational secretary of the I. O. D. E., announced last evening that applications are now open to Island students for an I. O. D. E. \$2,000 overseas post-graduate scholarship.

These scholarships are tenable at any university in the United Kingdom. The scholarship may be awarded for a second year to the same candidate.

Each scholarship is of the value of \$2,000 a year, and the Order expects that all who hold these scholarships will return to Canada and work there, after the completion of their work in a British university.

Criticize Lack Of Tunnel

LONDON, Sept. 3 (Reuters)—The London Evening Star today criticized Britain for not taking the lead in the construction of a tunnel linking England and France under the English Channel.

Such a tunnel would facilitate international trade and integrate the rail systems of western European countries, it said. The barrier to such integration was the absence of a channel tunnel.

It is chiefly Britain's fault that there is no tunnel. For years past France has led the campaign for it, and successive French governments have expressed willingness to put up their fair share of the cost," the Star said editorially.

The tunnel dream has persisted since 1880 when the English Channel Tunnel Company Ltd., was formed and actually started excavation. It dug a hole 1-4 miles out from the cliffs near Folkestone, then the army, fearing foreign invasion through the tunnel, had the government ban the enterprise.
