# Canadiens Defeat Boston Bruins 4-2

BOSTON (CP) — Montreal Canadiens, who haven't lost in their last 18 National Hockey League games, won their eighth in succession Sunday night in whipping the Boston Bruins 4-2. Bruins have won only one of their last 10 games.

Canadiens, who lead the league by a wide margin, have won all but two of those 18 matches. They tied with Chicago and Toronto.

Montreal scored two first-period goals, the first by Dickie Moore at 1:55 of the period while Boston was a man short. Claude Provost scored in the first period and again in the third. Jean Beliveau scored in the second period for Canadiens, who outskated Boston throughout the game.

Bronco Horvath scored both Boston goals, his 19th and 20th of the season, in the second period. Horvath, the league's leading scorer, achieved his 20 goals in just 24 games. Six of those goals were against Montreal.

The final 50 seconds of the game were delayed by a rough house match between Beliveau and Boston's Leo Labine.

After they had been separated and apparently were on their way to the dressing rooms, Beliveau suddenly lashed Labine with his stick.

The enraged Labine charged at Beliveau swinging his stick. Neither did much damage and finally were sent off, each with two minor penalties.

# Defensive Linemen Are Prominent In Cup Classic

 TORONTO (CP)—Looking for a Grey Cup hero? Or goat?

For the accolades meditate a bit on the defensive linemen, those big brawny fellows who do most of the hard work but usually get little glory.

They were prominent in Saturday's classic. Even the tank-like gentlemen who toil for Hamilton Tiger-Cats, beaten 21-7 by Winnipeg Blue Bombers.

The defensive teams played so brilliantly that they limited the attackers to a total of only 11 points for nearly 50 minutes of the game. On the ground the two teams managed only a net 216 yards—129 by Winnipeg and 87 by Hamilton.

Consider whom the Bombers had to deal with:

Gerry McDougall, explosive 225-pound runner who led ground-gainers in the eastern Big Four Football Union last season and placed second this year. McDougall, a six-foot-two fullback, was held to a measly 81 yards in 19 cracks at the Winnipeg line—an average of 4.3 yards a carry.

the goat's role. His fumble in the fourth quarter paved the way for Bombers' game-winning touchdown.

Then there was Ralph Goldston, a 190-pound halfback, who could make only 39 yards in nine carries for an average of 4.4.

Now take the Ticats. Running against them were such rock-hard customers as fullback Charlie Shepard, a 210-pounder formerly with Pittsburgh Steelers of the National Football League. Leo Lewis, the 190-pound "Lincoln Express" who once played for Lincoln College of Missouri, and 190-pound Canadian Gerry James.

Shepard, the Bombers' leading rusher in the Western Interprovincial Football Union this season with 1,076 yards in 174 carries for a 6.18 average, barged his way to only 54 in 16 runs Saturday. He averaged 3.4 yards.

Lewis, No. 2 man on the Bomber blitz corps this year with 730 yards in 112 carries for a 6.52 average, was able to lug the ball a mere 31 yards in nine attempts.

James, Winnipeg's left-footed placement and convert kicker, went for 34 yards in nine assaults at the Hamilton musclemen.

The Bombers completed four of 11 pass attempts for 104 yards. Quarterback Kenny Ploeh hit end Ernie Pitts with strikes of 23 and 33 yards, the latter for a touchdown with 10 seconds remaining in the game, and Farrell Funs-ton for 40 yards to set up the winning touchdown early in the final quarter. Lewis passed to James for eight yards.

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# Ron MacArthur Given Nod To Play With S'ide Entry

Summerside's Ron MacArthur has gotten the green light to play with Summerside's P.E.I. Aces, the western entry in the Island Senior Hockey League.

The ban barring MacArthur from playing with the Summerside squad was lifted last night at a meeting of ISHL executive at the Charlottetown Hotel.

The meeting was attended by the league executive representatives of SDU, Royals, Perfection Penguins and Aces.

However the ban on MacArthur's defense teammate on last year's championship team, Eustace Reeves, will continue. Reeves will not be allowed to play with Aces.

Hogan also told the group that the Summerside team would be known this year as the "P.E.I. Aces". The club is being sponsored by P.E.I. Concrete Products.

A residence rule was also passed at the meeting. By it any player who is not a resident of Prince Edward Island by Tuesday, Dec. 1 is not eligible to play with any league entry.

**69-GAME SLATE**  
 In addition the meeting passed a 69-game schedule. The schedule is a staggered, unbalanced one in which Summerside play 47 games, the Royals and Penguins 32 and St. Dunstan's University 13.

The two Charlottetown teams play seven extra games in Summerside while SDU will travel there one additional time. The visiting clubs will share in the gates for these extra trips that will enable Summerside to have two home games per week. The league standings will be figured on a percentage basis.

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## WANTED BALANCE

Originally MacArthur, Reeves and Doug Williams, all defense men, were barred from the Aces' lineup after a move to get two entries from Summerside to participate in the league failed.

At the time spokesmen for the league said the move was made to retain balance in the fledgling circuit. With the three defense stalwarts, it was pointed out the Aces might prove too powerful for the rest of the loop.

Doug Williams, now living and working in Charlottetown, has since turned up with the Penguins while Reeves has played one game with Sandy's Parkdale Royals. Reeves scored a goal in the Royals' 7-4 loss to Aces Monday night.

## BUSINESS IN S'SIDE

In permitting the sturdy MacArthur to return to the Summerside fold the league representatives took into consideration MacArthur's status as a business man in Summerside and his inability and unwillingness to play with any other team.

They also felt his return would not upset the present balance of the loop, which league president Ivan Docherty believed as first rate so far.

Aces' manager Charlie Hogan noted that he thought it would be after the Christmas season before MacArthur, because of pressure of business, would be able to turn out with the Aces.
