The Opening of Navigation.

The port of Pictou yesterday presented the rather unusual spectacle of two first-class steam boats, leaving the harbor at the same time for P. E. Island.

The S. S. Starly got under way a minute or so ahead, but was closely followed by the Northumberland, and considerable interest was excited amongst the passengers respecting which would first arrive at Chatham. The Stanley had the advantage of going right through any fields of floating ice that were met; but the Northumberland, drawing less water could bring the points closer and in this way gained a considerable advantage near Caribou. The two boats were going very level and steady up to this place, the Stanley leading by about 200 yards, but shortly afterwards an accident in the engine room of the steamer compelled the machinery to be stopped until repairs were effected. This took about 15 minutes, and when the Stanley again got under way the Northumberland was a long distance ahead.

But trouble for the Northumberland was soon encountered, a large field of ice being met to the eastward of Point Prim, through which slow progress could only be made.

This aroused hope in the Stanley's passengers, and the way that steamer cut through the floating ice was admirable. As some of the passengers remarked, "it was worth taking a trip to see it."

The detention of the Stanley through the accident, and the loss time caused by the ice to the Northumberland, pretty well equalized each other, and when the harbor's mouth was reached there was very little difference between the two. As a matter of fact, there was not over four or five minutes' difference in their docking.

Among the passengers in the Northumberland we noticed Dr. P. C. Murphy, of Kinross, who lately came out first at the University of New York, where he graduated, and Mr. Gordon Alley, who has been obliged to return from McGill College on account of a severe attack of influenza. Captain Finlayson and his officers look well after the arduous services they performed this winter; and we trust will long maintain their successful record as officers of the Stanley.
