 - 1/2 c. creamy French dressing (recipe follows)
 - Crisp lettuce
 - 12 black olives or 12 radish "roses" for garnish

Toss chicken, vegetables and rice with creamy French dressing. Refrigerate at least 30 min. Line salad bowl with lettuce; heap in salad mixture. Added Advice Concerning Slovenly Neighbor Problem

Dear Mary Haworth: Your exchange with GP, the person concerned to help untidy neighbors gain community acceptance, might have been headed at us, except that we do keep our outside premises neat, as a concession to public taste.

When our children were small, however, I am afraid we fell down on that score, too, even as GP's new neighbors do.

Your commentary undoubtedly hit on some elements in the situation that the average onlooker might miss. But you failed to direct GP's attention to a primary principle of Good Neighbor policy, to-wit: that which goes on inside a family's four walls, if it isn't harming the neighbors, is strictly the family's business.

Families of the sort that GP describes are often (if not necessarily artistic, creative or intellectual types. Their houses seem crowded with clutter because the parents as well as the children are involved in reading, writing, painting, drafting, figuring, etc., which they find more satisfying than neatness.

Nothing interests ahead families less than trivial talk with drop-in neighbors. The rude and difficult father (whom GP describes) may have a keener grasp of the great social issues of our times, and no patience whatever with uninformed people.

The bad manners of their children who, like mine, have good character and do well in school, may be a form of protest against artful, tedious, shallow, often insincere social "amenities." I am not defending, just explaining, you understand.

If the mistress of the untidy household seems uneasy when GP drops in, it may mean only that she senses GP's disapproval not that she (the mistress) values tidiness for its own sake.
