GREAT BRITAIN IN EGYPT.

One result of the present activity in the arsenals of Great Britain and the reported warlike intentions of the British Government, is intense public interest in the present position of Egypt. Egypt, it is well known, is a tributary state, paying the Sultan of Turkey every year tribute money to the amount of about \$3,300,000. Great Britain obtained a foothold in the country in this way: Turkey's vassal, the Khedive, got into financial difficulties. For the protection of his creditors, English and French commissioners were placed in charge of the revenues and finances of the country. Conditions established by the commissioners were disturbed in 1882 by the revolt of Arabi Pasha. The Sultan couldn't and wouldn't suppress the rebellion; the Government of Great Britain asked the Government of France to assist in putting it down; but France, in a moment of weakness, declined,—and Great Britain went in alone. Subsequently the occupation of Egypt by Great Britain was recognized by Turkey; and Great Britain, on her part, recognized the nominal sovereignty of the Sultan. Upon these conditions Great Britain has brought order out of chaos in Egypt,—has literally saved the country from ruin, and has crowned her work by the occupation of the Soudan on behalf of the Egyptian Government. After all this has been accomplished, she finds the Sultan and the Government of France plotting and working together to wrest from her the fruits of her labors and the advantages of her conquest. She finds Bahr-el-Ghazel—an important part of the conquered country—leased by Turkey to France, and she finds Russia and France entering into an engagement to unite in ousting her from Egypt, notwithstanding all that she has done and suffered and all that the Sultan of Turkey, the French and other creditors of Egypt and the people of Egypt at large have obtained consequent upon her action. It will be admitted that Great Britain has cause for her irritation and that the placing of her army and navy upon a war footing for the purpose of defeating the schemes of her jealous and unprincipled enemies is but a measure of prudence. If the Sultan had assumed the least responsibility for the government of Egypt; if France had helped in any considerable degree to administer the affairs of Egypt or win back the Soudan; if Russia had any material interest in the government of Egypt, there might be some excuse, some justification for the plotting that has been discovered. But not having done so, there is no excuse, no justification for their efforts to bring about the overthrow of the power of Great Britain in Egypt that has been fairly won by sword and statecraft.

LICENSING IN ENGLAND.

One Example of the Method Pursued.

The following extract from a Kentish newspaper illustrates the strictness of the methods in vogue by English licensing magistrates:

At the Dartford Adjourned Licensing Sessions, Francis John Ford, landlord of the Railway Hotel, Sidcup, one of the largest and most commodious hotels on the South Eastern Line, applied for a renewal of his license. The justices, since the regular annual licensing day, have had a notice of objection served on the applicant, on the ground that he had been convicted for drunkenness at the Greenwich Police Court last February. Mr. Ford, in addition to being landlord of the hotel, was also a traveller for the Deptford Distillery, and the hotel in Sidcup was carried on by his wife and daughters. It was admitted by the police that the house was conducted in a most respectable manner.

Mr. Lawless, barrister, stated that Mr. Ford has been to a birthday party on the occasion which formed the subject of the objection, and had unfortunately taken more drink than was good for him. He urged that the offence, under the circumstances, should not entail the very seriousness of forfeiture of his license. Mr. Ford expressed his very great regret for what had taken place; and there were present several of the most respectable inhabitants of Sidcup who would, if necessary speak to the excellent character of the house.

The chairman of the bench (Mr. Thos. Bevan), said the Court felt that a man who had a license should be above reproach as a sober man, and they would not be doing their duty if they renewed his license.

Mr. Furnage, who appeared for the owners of the house, asked the Magistrates to allow him to make a few remarks before their decision was recorded.

The chairman said the court could not allow their decision to be discussed, and refused to hear him.

Mr. Ford has been in the house about a year and a half, and has the lease for ten years. The effect of the decision, it is considered, entails a loss upon him of something like £10,000.
