## RCAF Royals Win Island Softball Championship

The RCAF Royals softball team won the Prince Edward Island men's softball championship in three straight games, defeating the Canada Packers from Charlottetown at the Summerside airport diamond last evening by the score of 14-11. It was a free hitting game with both teams collecting 13 hits.

The Packers scored five runs in the first inning, getting to Jackson, who started on the mound for the Royals for five base hits and all their hits this evening were earned. The Royals came right back with four runs in their half of the first frame, but a routine catch in centerfield would have returned the side without a counter had it not been bobbed by the Canada Packers centerfielder.

The Packers added two in the second and three in the third, during which frame Andrews relieved Jackson on the hill. With the score 10-4 for the visitors, the RCAF scored five runs in the bottom of the third drawing to within one run of the Packers. The visitors made it 11-9 in the fifth but failed to score in their final four innings, while the Royals scored one in the seventh and four in the eighth.

Armstrong came on for Andrews in the eighth and finished the game, getting credit for the victory. Hartinger went the route for the Packers.

Antonelli came to the Giants in exchange for Bob Thompson as the principals in a deal which also involved a few second-rate players. The Giants wanted the pitching and the Braves wanted the hitting. This year the Giants were the people who benefited because Thompson broke his leg during the pre-season training grind and was out of action until a month ago. Had he been in the lineup throughout the schedule the Braves likely would have been at the top of the heap right now.

The Giants really got a pitcher in Antonelli. He won his 21st game yesterday and in doing so took the Giants out of a three game losing streak. Only Antonelli could have won for the Giants against the Cards yesterday afternoon. His team-mates gave him only one run but that was enough. The Canadian Press writer who called Antonelli Leo Durocher's "meal ticket" hit the nail on the head.

We're not counting the Dodgers out yet after their week-end burst in which they won four games. They haven't got too much pitching and several of their regulars are too old but they still have some pretty good ball players in fellows like Snider, Hodges, Gilliam, Furillo and Reese. ## Antonelli Hurls Giants To 1-0 Victory Over Cardinals

Southpaw Johnny Antonelli, Leo Durocher's meal ticket," put New York Giants farther along the road to the National League pennant Monday with a neat five-hitter for a 1-0 victory over St. Louis Cardinals at the Polo Grounds.

The triumph, Antonelli's 21st of the campaign, extended the Giants' pace-setting margin to 3½ games over the second-place Brooklyn Dodgers, who were idle Monday.

The lone tally of the game came in the opening inning. With two out, Willie May blooped a double to right and scored on a single to the same area by Dusty Rhodes.

Antonelli, who pitched two innings in relief against Cincinnati Saturday, was superb, particularly after the fourth inning. He held the hard-hitting Cards hitless after that frame, allowing only Stan Musial to reach base on a ninth-inning walk.

The shutout was the young left-

hand's sixth of the year and third victory without a loss against St. Louis.

Rookie Gordon Jones, a curve-balling righthander, pitched well for the losers, allowing eight hits in the seven frames he worked.

Mays' double gave him an all-time Giant record of 82 extra-bases. He has 31 two-baggers to go along with 12 triples and 39 home runs. Mel Ott set the old standard with 81 in 1929.

Night games in the National League saw Cincinnati at Pittsburgh and Milwaukee a Philadelphia. The American League was idle.

**PHILADELPHIA (AP)**—The struggling Milwaukee Braves, behind the airtight relief pitching of Dave Jolly, defeated Philadelphia Phillies 7-4 Monday night to stay 4½ games behind New York Giants, the National League leaders.

Playing without their two top

sluggers, Ed Mathews and Joe Adcock, the Braves broke the game open in the eighth inning when they scored four runs on two hits, three walks, a sacrifice, and a hit batter, off southpaw Curt Simmons.

## Marciano And Charles To Arrive In New York Today

NEW YORK (AP)—Forecasts of "mostly fair and warm" weather for Wednesday night boosted the International Boxing Club's hopes that the return bout between heavyweight champion Rocky Marciano and Ezzard Charles will match the financial success of the first fight.

Promoter Jim Norris said the show was a little behind the first one at the same stage mainly because of hurricanes Carol and Edna.

The June 17 fight drew 47,585 fans and grossed \$543,092.

"We've got about \$250,000 in new," said Norris. "We're only about \$25,000 or so behind the other fight. That can be made up in one good hour of activity."

"We're still shooting at \$500,000 or thereabouts like the last one. We're geared to do \$250,000 to \$300,000 on the last day if the interest develops."

**WILL BE BROADCAST**

Norris said that the theatre-least people had guaranteed the IBC minimum of \$125,000 but that the theatre-TV cut could be considerably more. The IBC gets \$1 a seat for theatre-TV.

The fight, starting at 10:30 p.m. EDT, won't be telecast into the homes. It will be broadcast by CBS and radio will contribute another \$35,000 to the total pot.

Both fighters are due in New York sometime today. Marciano will fly in from Grossinger, N.Y., if the weather is good. If not he'll drive down. Charles will arrive by car.

Barrie's application for readmission came after Hap Ems, coach of the Flyers, said he had worked out an agreement with the Barrie arena commission to sponsor a team. Ems then forwarded the application to the OHA Sept. 11.

Earlier this season Ems reiterated his stand against playing on Sunday and said if the Flyers weren't permitted a professional team for a sponsor, he would withdraw them from the OHA junior A series.

## Mays Gains On Duke Snider

NEW YORK (AP) Willie Mays, the hustling New York Giants' outfielder, who is swinging for base hits instead of home runs, is only one point behind Brooklyn's Duke Snider in the competition for the National League batting title.

Mays collected two hits in the Giants' 1-0 victory over the St. Louis Cards Monday to bring his average to .341. Snider and the Dodgers were idle and Duke's mark remained at .342.

Willie has not hit a homer since he walloped No. 39 on Aug. 29 and has only three since July 28, when he threatened Babe Ruth's all-time mark.

In the American League, Bobby Avila, sparking Cleveland's front-running Indians, increased his lead with a three-point gain to 340 while his closest competitors were slumping.

Minnie Minoso of the Chicago White Sox moved into second place with a four-point climb to .327 while Irv Noren of the New York Yankees fell to third at .325. Minnie had 10-for-24 last week and Noren only 2-for-16.

Stan Musial of the Cards, seeking his seventh National League championship, still is within range of the leaders. He is hitting .335, despite a three-point loss on six hits to 23 at bats.

## Big Klu Seeking Home Run Honors

NEW YORK (AP)—Muscleman Ted Kluszewski of the Cincinnati Redlegs, former Indiana U. grid star, is making passes at Jack Wilson's National League home run record and if he continues his September slugging he's likely to break the 24-year-old standard.

With nine homers in his last 11 games, Kluszewski has pulled to within three games of Wilson's 1930 pace. When Hack hit 56, he walloped his 48th in his 139th game. Kluszewski has 48 in 142 games.

The husky first baseman from Argo, Ill., also can eclipse the National League homer mark for lefthanded batsmen—Johnny Mize of the New York Giants set that one with 51 in 1947.

Kluszewski is eight games behind Babe Ruth's homer rate of .60. The Bambino slamed his 48th in the Yankees' 134th contest in 1927.

Red has hit 34 of his homers at home and 14 on the road and the Redlegs have four games left at Crosley Field, their home ball yard.
