Christmas Means Cold Ride For Wife Of Injured Man

By **DOUG MARTIN VANCOUVER (CP)** - Christmas will be a long, cold bus ride for Jean Chabot, a 23-year-old mother whose two children have just reached an age where they enjoy hanging up stockings for Santa.
Her husband Al is lying in a Vancouver hospital with undetermined head injuries suffered in a car accident three months ago. Three-year-old Sean and Terra, 2, are back home at Prince George with Jean's parents.
Jean will give Al semi-conscious now after two months in a coma - a few small gifts and then board an overnight bus for Prince George 500 miles north in British Columbia's snow-bound northern interior.
She has sweaters, chocolates, playing cards and checkers for her husband. Al was a chess player before the accident, but Jean is afraid the game will be too difficult for him now.
Chabot worked as a machine operator for a railroad, but boxing was his life. He was twice Canadian amateur bantamweight champion and a promising young professional.
FRIENDS HELPING
It will be a sad Christmas for Jean Chabot, but Al's friends in boxing have tried to make it bright.
One has promised to purchase lumber and hire a carpenter to finish the home the Chabots were building in Prince George when the accident happened. Another gave Jean \$200 and a third gave \$100.
An amateur boxing card Nov. 26 at Prince George made a profit of \$1,400 for the Chabot family.
The city donated the use of

the 1,000-seat civic centre. Boxes and coaches from Vancouver made the 500-mile drive to attend.
Many of the coaches and boxers were merely paying back Al for past favors. One of the most popular athletes in Prince George, he was always available for benefits for others and he was a happy-go-lucky little guy who spent a good deal of his time in the gym helping youngsters.
The money made on the benefit will ease his family's problems.
Jean will be able to return to Vancouver after Christmas without immediate financial worries and continue visiting her husband.

Last year, and I repeat now, that policing such an edict - planting nothing but certified seed or better - would be a tremendous job.
I'll be watching developments with interest.
For the record other crop production estimates this year are 132,000 bushels of wheat, 5.2 million bushels of oats, 2.1 million bushels of mixed grain, 767,000 bushels barley, \$65,000 tons of hay.
We produced 5.9 million pounds of butter and 1.7 million pounds of cheese. Other statistics I'll leave for a future column. The reason will be apparent I think, when the column appears.
I have to thank my friend S. C. Wright, deputy minister of agriculture, for the figures cited above, with the exception of those on ring rot.
For the holiday season ahead my hope is that there will be as much happiness as circumstances permit. I have long since discarded the term "Merry Christmas and a Happy New Year", because I know for many of you Christmas will not be merry, and the New Year will not be happy.
I'm thinking now of people where death has struck recently - with its devastating grief, and other homes where suffering and pain are present. That's the reason for the wording I have used in my greeting to you.

China Steel Said Sold To Americans

LONDON (AP) - The Sunday Observer says Communist China sold steel bars worth \$1,000,000 to U.S. authorities for building bases in South Vietnam.
The report, in a dispatch from Singapore by Dennis Bloodworth, is attributed to reliable trading sources.
It says the traffic reached a peak earlier this year "when only Peking could plug a crucial gap in American supplies by meeting the specifications, the quantities and the six-week delivery date that alone would satisfy hard-pressed U.S. military purchasing officers."
The report says the steel was sold through intermediaries in Singapore, who transhipped it to Saigon while the Chinese were paid through Hong Kong banks.

This questionable commerce slackened in mid-year when Japanese and Belgian suppliers caught up with American demands and U.S. officials began tighter controls, the report says.

TORONTO (CP) - A fundamentalist minister Sunday proposed a neutral religious policy for public schools and asked for support from all faiths. In a sermon to 2,000 persons at the People's Church congregation, broadcast over a Toronto radio station, Rev. Paul R. Smith declared war on both religious and anti-religious teaching in school. He said perhaps the Bible should not be taught in our schools, but "I intend to see that atheism and agnosticism are not taught either."
