Gen. Bradley Sees Little Danger Of U. S. Being Invaded And Overrun

By ROGER D. GREENE WASHINGTON, Jan. 22 — (AP) — Gen. Omar Bradley told Congress today there is "little real danger now" that enemy invasion forces could over-run the United States "so far as we can see."

The general, chairman of the United States joint chiefs of staff, said that in the event of war, some enemy bombers might get through to attack American cities, but he declared:

"Our own program of defence against air attack, combined with the efforts of the Canadians, will provide such air defence for this country that complete disaster will not overtake us."

Bradley gave that estimate of U.S. readiness to cope with air or land assault in testimony before the Senate preparedness subcommittee. The group is studying a Defence Department bill to extend the draft to 18-year-olds and lengthen draft service from 21 to 27 months.

Up to now, the administration has suffered more grudging criticism on foreign policy from its own back-benchers, conditioned by what the Manchester Guardian calls Labor's "ancestral pacifism," than from the Conservative opposition.

Widespread Criticism

There has been widespread criticism from independent and left-wing as well as from Conservative publications on the Government's alleged failure to give a lead on foreign policy during the five-week Christmas recess. One neutral commentator, the Weekly-Economist, said sarcastically that in the one Government statement — a broadcast by Attlee — every sentence seemed to start with "unfortunately."
