TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER. The Bishop-Elect. HALIFAX, Feb. 1. There were forty-four of the clergy and forty-one lay delegates present at the Synod this forenoon. The first business was to rescind the power given to the English Bishop to nominate a head for this diocese. Hon. A. G. Jones severely commented on the manner in which the Archbishop of Canterbury treated the request of this diocese. Both the Low and High Church were unanimous to nominate Dr. Courtney, of Boston. Judge Townsend and Rev. F. R. Murray claimed the floor. It was awarded to Judge Townsend, and Rev. Mr. Murray seconded the nomination. There were three blank ballots cast by the delegates in each house. The rest were all for the Boston Divine. The new bishop is 50 years of age, and was educated at Glasgow University. He came to New York in 1876, and shortly after became Rector of St. Paul's, Boston. He is a moderate High Churchman. A telegram was read from Dr. Courtney accepting the position, and he is to be consecrated in St. Luke's Cathedral, at a time to be named by the Metropolitan.

The Georgetown Carnival.

The Carnival at Georgetown last evening was a decided success. The Rink was tastefully decorated with flags, Chinese lanterns, &c. The costumes were all new, and well gotten up, surpassing anything of the kind ever produced in Georgetown before. The Artillery Brigade Band, furnished the music which is a guarantee that it was first-class. The only drawback was the size of the Rink, which was altogether too small to accommodate the large number of people who came from the surrounding country to attend the Carnival. British Parliament.

LONDON, Feb. 1. Lord Hartington has issued a circular to dissenting members of the Commons, saying that important business will require their presence immediately upon the opening of Parliament. A cabinet council will be held on Friday to mould statements in the speech from the Throne. The ministerial circle is confident that the reference to the foreign situation will be optimistic. The speech also congratulates Parliament upon the improved condition of Ireland and upon the general revival of trade and upon the hopeful prospects for the National finances. A group of ultra radical members of Parliament is communicating with the Parnellite members with the object of concerting obstructive tactics. Large contingents of Parnellites will join the group, refusing to adhere to the Gladstone-Parnell policy of non-obstruction.

Marine Disasters.

NEW YORK, Feb. 1. The British steamer Samara, which arrived to-day, reports the wreck of a two-masted schooner with foremast 15 feet above water. She lies 21 miles south by east of Absecon Light and is dangerous to navigation. She also reports that the brig, Fannie, of Charlottetown, P. E. Island, from Montecristo, for Hamburg, with mahogany and logwood, was wrecked January 11. All hands were saved.

Gamble's Fate.

TORONTO, Feb. 1. John Gamble was tried at the criminal assizes to-day for murdering Lizzie Bray (a young girl he had betrayed), by procuring an abortion upon her. The jury were out three hours and returned with a verdict of guilty, with a strong recommendation to mercy. Gamble was completely broken down, and sobbed like a child. Judge Falconbridge then sentenced Gamble to be hanged on March 6th.

The Fisheries.

HALIFAX, Feb. 1. Twenty-three fishing vessels are building in Lunenburg County. The fish market is still booming. All incoming fishing schooners report terrible weather on the banks. Seven Yankees are here for repairs and one arrived at Liverpool to-day. The Gloucester schooner Restless was abandoned on Georges Banks. The crew were rescued and have been landed at Yarmouth.

Steamship Line.

MONTREAL, Feb. 1. Arrangements have been concluded between the Grand Trunk Railway and Anderson, McKenzie & Co., by which the latter firm undertake to place a line of steamers on the route between Portland, Me., and Liverpool. The steamers will run in connection with the Grand Trunk and will belong to the Furness Line. They begin their fortnightly service next month.

Looking for Damages.

MONTREAL, Feb. 1. Wang Ching Foo, a Chinese lecturer from New York, is here to arrange about a suit against the Dominion Government for \$5,000 damages on account of the action of the officials of the Niagara Falls, Ont., who put him in bond on the 13th November last.

Imperial Federation League.

TORONTO, Feb. 1. A meeting for organization of the Toronto branch of the Imperial Federation League was held to-night. Hon. John Beverley Robinson, ex-Lieut. Governor, was elected president.

Obituary.

HALIFAX, Feb. 1. Sir Hugh William Hoyles, ex-Chief Justice of Newfoundland, died to-night, aged 73.
