Military Opinions Regarding Plan of Campaign.

WHAT BULLER IS BELIEVED TO BE DOING.

Boers at Colesburg Said to be Virtually Surrounded.

Still no Word from Buller—London Strangely calm at the Stake Buller is said to be Playing for—Mr. Chamberlain's Elcquent Speech — Says there will be no second Majuba—Troops being Poured into Africa.

HOPEFUL FEELING.

DURBAN, Feb. 1.—The transport Purua from India, has arrived, and landed a battery of artillery.

A more hopeful feeling prevails here.

MILITARY OPINION.

LONDON, Feb. 6, 4 a. m.—Military opinion in London continues to assume, from very slender materials, that General Buller is again throwing his army against the Boer works.

A retired General Sir William Henry Green, whose distinguished career gives weight to his opinions, thinks that General Buller with 25,000 men is making a wide detour to the west and north in order to avoid the roughest part of the country.

PLAN OF CAMPAIGN.

LONDON, Feb. 6.—Spencer Wilkinson, in the Morning Post says: "The tide is beginning to turn.

"In the western theatre of the war it looks as though General French had been reinforced perhaps by General Cherside's brigade. This would be the beginning of a systematic direction of the campaign. When General French has disposed of the enemy forming his present objective, his force will be available for other operations.

SUDDEN DEATH.

HALIFAX, Feb. 1.—Alfred Browne, superintendent of the railway mail service, died here very suddenly yesterday.

AN OVERWHELMING FORCE.

CAPE TOWN, Feb. 6.—A despatch from Naauwpoort says: "There is great activity here and on the Rensburg-Hanoker Road, due to the despatch of an overwhelming force of infantry to seize Norval's Post.

The cavalry having completed a reconnaissance is being retired to recoup losses. The Boers at Colesberg are virtually surrounded.

CALM IN LONDON.

LONDON, Feb. 6.—Still there comes no word from Buller. There is absolutely not a spread of confirmation vouchsafed of the persistent rumor that he had crossed the Tugela river and had set his face toward Ladysmith, and queerly enough there has been an absence of sensational rumors.

London itself is strangely calm at the tremendous stake General Buller is assumed to be playing for.

A few people, during the day, hung around the War Office. But no excite-

ment was shown, and apparently no anxiety was felt, and in the clubs, hotels and theatres the same condition is held there.

AN ELOQUENT SPEECH.

LONDON, Feb. 6.—In the course of a speech delivered in the House of Commons, yesterday, Mr. Chamberlain said: "There will be no second Majuba. Never, again, shall Boers erect in heart of South Africa a citadel whence to proceed to raise disaffection and race animosity. Never again shall they be able to treat an Englishman as though he belonged to an inferior race.

"We have suffered checks and have made mistakes. I am not anxious to dispute as to the blame. Let the government bear the brunt until the time comes when, under happier auspices, we can see how far the blame is to be apportioned between the system and those administering it. In the meantime, blame us.

"What is now urgent is to redress those checks and to repair mistakes. "You say we have sent too few troops. But we are pouring them into South Africa. In a few weeks we will have 200,000 men there. We will have as many mounted men as there are Boers.

"Our colonies are multiplying their offers. Every offer is gratefully accepted, and Lord Roberts has selected from among the Colonials his guard of honor.

Meanwhile the spirit of the nation is unbroken. There is no sacrifice we are unwilling to ask of the colonies if we think it necessary to success."

The Colonial Secretary concluded with a glowing tribute to the manner in which the colonies have rallied to the support of the Empire, saying, "We are now finding the infinite potentialities and resources of the Empire. We are advancing to a realization of that great federation of our race which must inevitably make for Peace, Liberty and Justice."

MEETING OF CITIZENS.

In accordance with notice, a large meeting of the ratepayers of Charlottetown was held in the Market Hall last evening.

The following gentlemen addressed the meeting, viz., Dr. Warburton, Mayor of the City (presiding), Messrs. S. W. Crabbe, Donald Nicholson, T. Z. Taylor, D. L. Hooper, Alexander Horne, P. S. Brown, L. P. Tanton, J. F. Whear, John P. Tanton and Geo. E. Hughes.

Upon motion of Mr. W. H. Aitken, seconded by Mr. L. L. Beer, and supported by Mr. W. A. Weeks, it was unanimously resolved that Dr. Warburton be nominated for the office of Mayor.

The following resolution was submitted by Mr. Geo. E. Hughes and seconded by Mr. James Paton:

Resolved, That this meeting request the Legislative Assembly of this Province, at its next session, to amend the "Act incorporating the City of Charlottetown" repealing the present ward system of electing Councillors and providing for the election of Mayor and Councillors by the accumulative vote of the citizens.

The resolution was adopted.

The following telegram from Vancouver was received by Mayor Hamilton of Halifax on Saturday evening:

"A large and enthusiastic public meeting of the citizens of Vancouver was held to-night and passed strong resolutions urging the Dominion Government to offer the Imperial Government £1,000 contingent for South Africa, and asking the hearty co-operation and simultaneous action of every city, municipality, and Board of Trade in Canada. If approved, will you call a public meeting of your citizens at once to pass similar resolutions, telegraphing copies to Premier Laurier, and your own representative of the Dominion parliament, and urging immediate action.

Mayor Hamilton stated that the Herald that in common with other portions of Canada the people of Halifax were keenly interested in the war now going on in South Africa, and were prepared to sacrifice everything possible to have it brought to a successful issue. Much more would depend upon the action by the representatives of the people in the House of Commons in respect to offering further aid to the Mother Country.
