In the afternoon the sacrament of Confirmation will be administered.

THE STEAMER WILLIAM arrived here from New York yesterday morning with a general cargo. After discharging and being inspected by Messrs. Stevens and Cook, she took in 8,000 bushels of potatoes and sailed for Boston at 11 o'clock this forenoon. She would have been loaded and ready for sea much sooner were it not that the regular inspection had to be made this trip while the inspectors were here.

ARRESTED.—A half-demented female, giving her name as Annabella McGee, of St. Mary's Road, after wandering around the city hatless and shoeless, was taken to the Police Station by several officers about noon. She imagines some young man intends to murder her, but does not appear very much troubled over the affair. For the past fortnight she says she has worked at Mrs. Edmunds, Richmond Street. Her friends should have her removed home at once.

AN ISLANDER ABROAD.—Bishop Courtney, shortly after his arrival in London, received a letter from a man calling himself Somers, asking for £2 10s. to make up the money needed to enable him to assist his mother in Charlottetown—who was said to be into a dying state, in a letter which he enclosed purporting to come from the Rev. T. H. Hunt. From both of them speaking of "Prince Edward's Island," his Lordship came to the conclusion that the man was a fraud, and put the matter into the hands of the police, who reported that no one of the name of Somers lived at the address given, but that a person had called for letters several times and that it was undoubtedly a cheat. This incident might be noted by editors of newspapers in Bangor and St. John.

BISHOP KINGDON AT ST. LUKE'S.—There was an ordination service at St. Luke's yesterday when the following named were made priests of the Church of England: Rev. A. W. Smithers (son of George); Rev. H. Beers, of King's College, a native of P. E. I.; and Rev. L. E. Skey, curate of St. Paul's. David Richards, B. A., of St. David's Lampeter, Wales, lately arrived from England, was made a Deacon. Bishop Kingdon, co-adjutor to Bishop Medley, Metropolitan of Canada, performed the ceremony. In beginning the ordination sermon Bishop Kingdon became ill and was forced to retire to the vestry. Dean Giffin then took the pulpit and preached an appropriate sermon. At its conclusion the congregation were glad to find that Bishop Kingdon had recovered sufficiently to be able to proceed with the ceremony. Halifax Herald.

BRITISH AND PORTUGUESE.

An Engagement on the Pungwe River.

British Victories over Odds.

LONDON, May 26. There has been a collision between the Portuguese troops and the British South Africa Company's expedition at River Pungwe. The Portuguese numbered two hundred and fifty Europeans and five hundred natives with four guns. The British force sixty white and one gun. The Portuguese were repulsed with seven killed and a large number wounded.

NEWFOUNDLAND.

An Ugly Situation.

Bad Blood Aroused by the Tactics of the British Government.

St. John's, Nfld., May 26. Advice from the Newfoundland delegates in London are disappointing at the unconciliatory attitude of the Government in preparing to proceed with Knutsford's bill on Thursday; also, in withholding a definite assurance that the Newfoundland Legislature's bill would be regarded as a purely temporary settlement of the question in dispute. The Newfoundland Legislature passed the local coercion bill on Saturday night with closed doors. There is great public indignation in consequence. The Governor's proclamation asking an observance of the Queen's Birthday yesterday was disregarded, all business places being open. On Sunday night the halyards of the flagstaff on the Colonial Building were cut and an attempt was made to burn down the royal standard flagstaff on Government House.

THE MANIPUR AGITATION.

Lord Landsdowne's Recall Expected.

LONDON, May 26. It is generally believed that the agitation in parliament over the Manipur massacre will result in the recall of Lord Landsdowne from India.

Labor Troubles.

LONDON, May 26. A lockout of the London carpenters began yesterday. Fifteen thousand men are idle. The employers threaten a lockout of masons, plasterers and men employed in other branches of house-building trade.

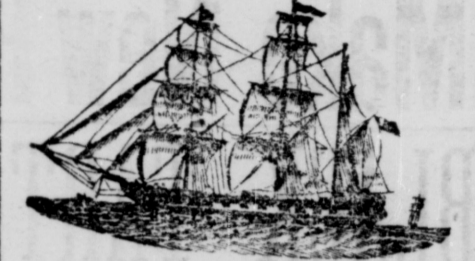
