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JAPANESE EXTEND BLOCKADE IN SOUTH CHINA

GERMAN-RUSSIA TRADE TALKS HOLD INTEREST

ARE REGARDED OF POLITICAL SIGNIFICANCE

Russia Seen Using Negotiations As Bargaining Weapon With Britain And France.

BERLIN, July 25—Nazi Germany and Communist Russia, ideological opposites, have embarked on a course of grave international tension upon trade negotiations, announcing to the world that they are desirous of increasing the commerce between them. Neither side believes it is yielding in its abhorrence for the political system of the other by perfecting machinery for bartering Russian raw materials against German industrial products. Foreign diplomatic quarters in Berlin are convinced that Joseph Stalin in Moscow welcomes the negotiations as a means of inducing the British and French to improve their offers for a mutual aid pact with Russia.

They point to the fact that among the prominent persons who attended the Munich Art Festival July 16 was the counsellor of the Russian Embassy, George Astachov, while representatives of the western powers were absent. As for the Germans, their official spokesmen never fail to mention the possibility that Poland may find herself ground between the German and Russian millstones. "They do not go so far as to say that a German-Russian alliance may result, but they do say that a strong national Russia, with the Jewish influence eliminated, would make an ideal partner for a pact to which Germany is the other party."

Accidents Send Two To Hospital Paving Company Employee In Serious Condition — R.W. Cox Suffers Broken Leg.

As a result of the second serious accident in the province in the space of 12 hours Mr. Peter Szbel, Toronto, grade foreman on the paving contract at Ellerslie, last night lay in a critical condition in the Prince County Hospital suffering from severe injuries to the chest and pelvis bone and abrasions about the head and body. Working at the Ellerslie gravel pit the victim in some unaccountable manner got underneath a truck which was unloading gravel and the vehicle starting passed over his back. He was rushed to the Prince County Hospital where latest reports last night described his condition as very critical with the full extent of his injuries yet to be determined. The accident took place around 7 o'clock yesterday morning.

The second incident of the day took place at North River yesterday afternoon between 2 and 3 o'clock when Mr. Resnick Cox, line foreman of the Maritime Electric Co., suffered a broken right leg.

240 BRITISH PLANES ROAR OVER FRANCE

R. A. F. Bombers On Long Range Training Flight — Air Chiefs Confer.

LONDON, July 25—Into the blue skies of France 240 Royal Air Force bombers roared today in the British Air Ministry's most ambitious long-range training flight, while British and French air authorities conferred here "on matters of common interest." More than 1,000 Britons were in the French skies, travelling often at 800 miles an hour over the territory of Great Britain's continental ally. In hamlets, towns and cities enthusiastic Frenchmen stopped in the streets and greeted them with a shout of "Les Anglais!" The mass flight of bombers and combat machines was the third and most important of a series of training flights over France designed to familiarize British aviators with French terrain and long distance flying. The aircraft took off in squadron formation at intervals this morning and all were back at their bases by mid-afternoon.

Engaged at work in replacing old poles with new ones, Mr. Cox was assisting his men when a pole, which had been removed from the ground rolled off the embankment on which it had been placed. FRANCO FACES SPLIT WITH ARMY CHIEFS

General Llano And Other Nationalists Oppose Program Of Falangist Party.

HENDAYE, France, July 25—General Gonzalo Queipo de Llano, military Nationalist Commander during the Spanish civil war, was reported today to have asked General Franco to form a military dictatorship to rule Spain and to oust the blue-shirted Falangist Party. Queipo de Llano backed by a number of other Nationalist leaders including General Juan Yague, former commander of the Moroccan Army Corps, General Jose Solchaga, another civil war commander, Minister of Finance and General Amado, and leaders of both Carlist and Alfonso Monarchist groups, was said to have made the proposal today in a second interview with General Franco at Burgos. According to these reports reaching the border, one of the group's requests was that the Falangist Party be ousted from the government and replaced by a military dictatorship. General Franco had not yet made a decision.

Major D. L. McKeen, commander of the Eastern Arctic Patrol on the Nascope reported the 12-mile channel running from Hudson Strait into Lake Harbor was full of winter ice floes. It was the worst ice conditions during the 17 years the annual tour in the eastern Arctic has been made.

YOUNG PASTOR RELEASED BY ARAB CAPTORS

Describes Harrowing Experience Which Ended With Friendship Feast.

JERUSALEM, July 25—(AP)—Exhausted and suffering from illness as a result of eating tribal food, the Rev. TENSION, UNRELAXED

SHANGHAI, July 25—(AP)—Great Britain's agreement to recognize Japan's right-of-way in occupied Chinese areas failed to halt spreading anti-British campaigns in North China today as new Anglo-Japanese friction developed in Shanghai. Orders passed out from the Japanese sponsored political party, Hsinminhui at Peking, to branches in Shansi, Shantung, Hopei and Honan Provinces to tighten anti-British boycotts and demonstrations. The organization announced plans to widen the anti-British activities through the use of theatres, moving pictures, posters and cartoons. In part the damage was done by agreement in the House of Commons yesterday the British Foreign Secretary, Lord Halifax, said it was expected the action would bring a halt to anti-British demonstrations in China.

Approximately every 10th Berliner somehow will be engaged actively in carrying out protective measures. The exercises will appear from the streets and seek shelter in air raid cellars. Order Closing Of Canton River For Two Weeks Move Designed To Halt Shipping With Hong Kong—Effective Midnight Tonight.

HONG KONG, July 25—(AP)—The Japanese Navy announced today that it would close the Canton River for two weeks beginning at midnight tomorrow in a move reported reliably as designed to blockade shipping between Canton and this British Crown Colony. Simultaneously with closing of the river, explained officially as for "military reasons," it was said the Japanese also planned to blockade the British and French concessions of Shamen Island at Canton. Notice of the river closing was served today by the Japanese Consul at Canton on consular authorities of the United States and other foreign powers. Foreign quarters at Canton were without official information, however, on the reported plans to blockade the British and French Concessions at Canton, where the United States Consulate and American business houses are located.

Crops Suffer Heavy Damage From Drought

TORONTO, July 25—Ontario forestry officials joined farmers and orchardists tonight in hoping the Dominion Meteorological Bureau forecast of continuing high temperatures for the province would prove wrong. Weather prognosticators could see only a possibility of thunder-showers for the western counties of the province, while bright skies and high temperatures were predicted for other fruit and farming areas. Fruit growers and agriculturists watched their parched crops and also turned anxiously to their wells and water supplies as the dry spell extended in many sections well into its second week. Forestry officials said the timber-land areas were "drier and held their men and equipment ready. No serious fires were reported but minor bush fires were flaming in northern districts. Campers, berry-pickers and other persons in the woods were warned to exercise extreme caution in lighting fires. The weather bureau officials said the warm weather, bordering on a heat wave, was coming in from the southwestern United States and no sign of a break in the dry spell appeared in prospect.

Rescue activities were made, exceedingly difficult by the fact that the submarine lies in very deep water, Voelkischer Beobachter said. A very heavy sea was reported.

British Steamship Strikes Mine Off The Coast Of China

HONG KONG, July 25—The captain of the 3,554-ton British steamship Hattain advised her owners tonight that she struck a mine off the coast which tore a hole in her side, flooding one of her holds. Then called the Sylvia, the vessel used to be well known in Newfoundland and Eastern Canadian waters. The Hattain was in no immediate danger, the captain said, although she had to anchor off the coast a little north of Swatow. Naval authorities indicated a British destroyer probably would go to her aid. Japanese naval officers recently announced mine fields would be laid northeast of Swatow and elsewhere along the South China coast. However, it was believed possible the mine might have drifted from mine fields off China's east coast some time ago off Pootung and Ningpo, further north.
