Farm Production Up In Canada; Down In P.E.I.

OTTAWA (CP)—Canada's agricultural production rose by some 28 per cent in 1955, largely because of more bountiful Prairie grain crops.

The index for measuring production volume, based on 1935 = 100, rose to 150.1 in calendar 1955, a gain of 33 points or some 28 per cent over 1954, the bureau of statistics reported Monday. The peak of 166 was reached in 1952.

In addition to larger Prairie crops, increases in dairy products, potatoes and livestock contributed to the over-all rise. These offset declines in poultry, sugar beets, tobacco and maple products.

The 1955 index, with 1954 standings in brackets: Quebec 140.5 (129); New Brunswick 135.4 (113.8); Nova Scotia 96.8 (88.2); Prince Edward Island 142.4 (149.7).

Eddie Blanchard who spent the past winter in Hamilton Ont., is now returned and is visiting friends in Howlan.

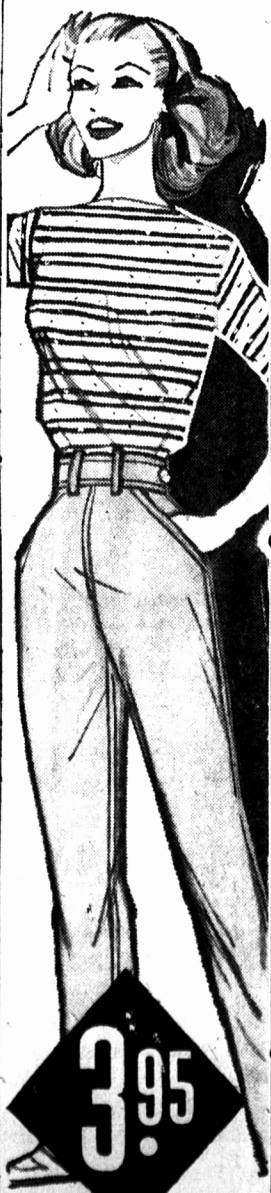

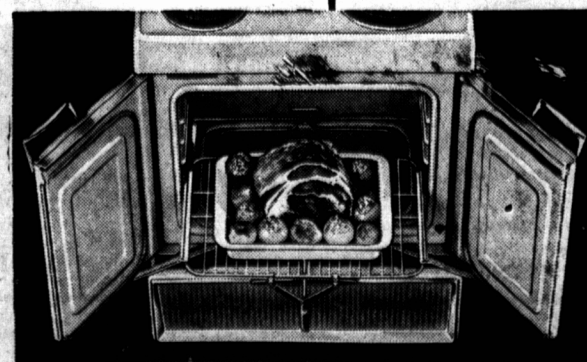
