Egg Production At Peak Levels

Egg production on Prince Edward Island continues at peak levels, reports Mr. F. M. Nash, district inspector of poultry products. While peak of production was reached the third week in April in 1951, it is apparently one month later this year. Marketings through registered stations for the first four months this year are 10% higher than for same period in 1951. Quality of the product is fair to good. Demand for the product is good and all available supplies are moving readily to Nova Scotia, New Brunswick, Quebec and Newfoundland.

Last week may have constituted a record in inspected shipments for any one week in that approximately 2,500 cases were inspected for shipment out of the Province. Dealers report market is a bit stronger but as yet there has been no change in prices. Producers are receiving for ungraded eggs delivered AL 30, AM 25, AS 22, B 19, C 15. Dealers quoting station operators for graded pack delivered AL 36-7, AM 34-5, AS 28, B 25, C 21, and wholesaling this pack to retailers at AL 41, AM 39, AS 32, B 30. Eggs are retailing to consumers AL 45-9, AM 39-45, AS 40, B 40.

Poultry receipts although still very light are 47% higher for the first five months of 1952 as compared to same period in 1951. A few broilers and fryers are now making their appearance but receipts consist mainly of fowl. There is no change in poultry prices.

Hatchery Situation

There is very little change to report in the hatchery situation here. Total chicks hatched to May 31st as compared to same period in 1951 are 4% higher. At least four hatcheries have reported making last sets consequently it is anticipated that production for June and July this year will be considerably lower than for the same months last year. In direct contrast, however, one breeder hatchery reports being two weeks behind on orders and expects to operate into July. Small over-the-counter sales are a little brisker now and relieving the surplus of brooded chicks which some hatcheries are carrying. Hatchability continues very good, with the following flock owners having 80% hatchability and over during the past week:

GEORGE T. McLURE — Called home to rest beyond the vale of weeping. Our loving Father he has willed it so. In Heaven above safe in the Saviour's keeping. Oh! blest abode where sorrow's tears never flow.

Death has again removed from our midst another of our highly respected citizens in the person of Mr. George T. McLure, who passed to his eternal rest April 3rd, 1952, at the age of 70 years.

Elders son of the late Gertie D. McLure and Margaret Dixon, he was born at Murray Harbour North, July 11th, 1882, and was one of a family of twelve, of whom five brothers and one sister survive and mourn the loss of a beloved brother. They are Adam, Charlie and Benjamin of Montague; Chester and Howard of Murray Harbour North; and Isabel of Taunton, Mass. A sister Barbara, Mrs. Arthur Reynolds, and two brothers, William and Cameron, also a brother and sister in infancy, predeceased him.

In youth he answered the call of adventure and joined the number of Islanders who went to Western Canada. After spending a few years there, he returned to his native Island and was a life-long resident of this district.

He was united in marriage with Emma Dalziel, daughter of the late James Dalziel and Martha Reynolds. To this union were born four children who now cherish the memory and mourn the guidance and devotion of a loving father. They are: Eileen, Mrs. William Graham, Gaspereaux; Hazen and James of Murray Harbour North, and Preston of Montague, who returned from Labrador a few days before his father passed away. There are also five grandchildren.

The late Mr. McLure was endowed with a quiet cheerful nature and possessed many fine qualities of mind and heart which won for him the esteem and confidence of all who knew him. A farmer by occupation, he enjoyed his work. Every duty which he undertook was well and conscientiously performed. Through thrift and industry he maintained, together with his devoted partner, that ideal of home and family life which will linger in lasting tribute to his memory.

The death of his beloved wife on April 28, 1942, was a sorrow that clouded his life, but the constant love and kindness of his family soaced his later years.

In early life he professed his faith in Christ and united with the Presbyterian Church, a regular supporter and worshipper until prevented by ill health.

Upon entering the Kings County Memorial Hospital for treatment, he was assiduously attended by doctors, nurses and loved ones who looked forward to his ultimate recovery, but God who "doeth all things well", willed otherwise and after a brief illness on above date, his spirit took its flight to the Heavenly home prepared by Him whom he loved and served.

Perhaps if we could see the splendor of that land to which loved ones are called from you and me—we'd understand. Perhaps if we could hear the welcome they receive from old familiar voices, oh so dear—we should not grieve. Perhaps if we could know the reason why they went, we'd smile and wipe away the tears that flow, and wait content.

The sympathy of the entire community goes out to the bereaved at this time.

The funeral, which was largely attended, was held on Saturday afternoon, April 5th, in the Presbyterian Church, Murray Harbour North. The impressive service was conducted by Rev. F. N. Young of Montague.

Taking to his text Psalm 27, verse 14: "Wait, I say, on the Lord", he spoke words of comfort to the bereaved and paid fitting tribute to the departed. Hymns sung were: "The Lord's My Shepherd", "Shall We Gather At The River", and a selection, "There'll Be No Shadows" was fittingly rendered by the choir.
