Closed Season Fishing Costs Man \$50 Fine

ALBERTON — A Nail Pond resident, James Edward Bernard, was found guilty by Magistrate W. Chester S. MacDonald here yesterday of placing lobster gear on the fishing grounds of district 8 during a closed season and was fined \$50 and costs or one month in jail.

Bernard, who was not present, had previously pleaded not guilty.

Evidence in the case was given by fishery officer L. H. Cheverie and Warden, Reg. Eldershaw. Neil R. MacLeod appeared for the department of fisheries.

For causing a disturbance in a public place, Bruce Francis Phee of Tignish was fined \$100 and costs or one month. Phee was placed under arrest by Alberton Police Officer John Arthur following a disturbance at the Alberton Legion but escaped custody enroute to the town jail.

For causing a disturbance at the Palmer Road Hall, Percy

Arsenault, Waterford, was fined \$25 and costs or 30 days. Louis Francis Gavin, Tignish, Harold Kenneth Gullett, Alberton, and Peter Alcide Pineau, Duvar, were fined \$10 and costs each for driving without a valid drivers license.

Claude David Barnett, Alberton, was fined \$50 and costs for driving while his license was suspended.

A charge of stealing a bicycle against Robert John Kinch, Alberton South, was adjourned for one week.

James Neiligan, Norway, was fined \$10 for tire squealing. Two persons from Tignish and one each from Duvar, Portage, Campbellton and Harper Road, received fines of \$20 and costs for possession of intoxicating liquor, and a man from Tignish was fined the same amount for intoxication.

North Shore Accommodations Are Limited
Tourist accommodations on the North Shore camping ground are limited. A spokesman for the Prince Edward Island Tourist Bureau yesterday said trailer accommodations and tenting spaces at Stanhope are all filled. The situation at Cavendish is

much the same with 200 tenting spaces filled and all but three out of 77 trailer spaces occupied. However, there are no tourists in the Rustico Island Park. The power plant was struck by lightning last week and the park is without light and water. A new pump is expected to be installed by Friday said a spokesman of the tourist association.

20 Joint Programs Affect P.E.I.'s Renewable Resources

OTTAWA (Special) — The Canadian Council of Resource Ministers reported yesterday there are 20 joint programs and agreements affecting the island's renewable resources.

In a summary of the many types of programs which involve joint federal and provincial activity, the council said the federal government is involved in 69 such programs which include formal agreements as well as informal understandings with the provincial governments concerned.

In P.E.I. there are three agreements respecting land, including the Maritime Marshland Reclamation Act, Resources and the Trans-Canada Highway. Under water, there are certain public works

and hydrometric and sediment surveys. Under agriculture there is the lime assistance policy and a soils survey.

ARDA, with six programs, is the largest segment in P.E.I. with alternative uses of land, rural development, soil and water conservation, soil capability and research all involved.

Fishermen are involved in fishing vessels assistance, industrial development, Fisheries Act management and ship construction assistance.

In addition, there are composite forestry agreements, a Trans Canada Highway program and picnic area program and winter works campground and picnic areas.

Fine Of \$75 Is Imposed For Dangerous Driving

Marcellus Joseph Reid of Ontario was fined \$75 and costs for driving in a manner dangerous to the public when he appeared yesterday in Queens County Magistrate's Court.

Constable Ian Oland of the RCMP, Charlottetown, stated he chased the accused from Hunter River to New Glasgow at speeds exceeding 90 miles per hour. The constable stated that the police vehicle speedometer stuck during the wild chase on a secondary road.

Barry Curtis MacLeod and his brother John Earl MacLeod of Brighton Shore, were charged with break entry of MacDonald's Grocery at Mayfield June 21 and theft of a safe, cash box and approximately \$130 in cash, the property of Mrs. E. MacDonald of Mayfield. Barry was represented by C. R. McQuaid, QC, and had his case remanded to July 9 for election with bail to stand. John MacLeod obtained no counsel but pleaded guilty and elected to be tried by magistrate without a jury. The accused was remanded to June 14 for sentencing.

ASSAULT CASE
A charge of assault against

George Sterling Bernard of Fredericton saw a fine of \$20 and costs levied when he pleaded guilty to the charge.

The victim, Oliver Henry Parkman of Fredericton, said Bernard came to his house and hit him in the eyes with his fist. When asked about the reason for this, the accused told the court that he was drinking.

Richard Edward Rush of 65 Rochford Street was fined \$10 and costs or five days when he pleaded guilty to violating a highway traffic sign in a no-passing zone.

The case of Leigh Semple of Winsloe, charged with unlawfully disturbing the peace and quiet of people in a dwelling place by discharging a fire arm in a public place, was adjourned to July 14 after the accused pleaded not guilty. Council for the accused is C. R. McQuaid.

N.B. Veteran Served Here

Frank Albert Grimmer of St. Andrews, N. B., died at the Charlotte County Hospital June 29 after a few days illness. He was 74.

A veteran of two World Wars, Mr. Grimmer served with the Veterans Guard in the second conflict with the rank of captain. He was stationed at Charlottetown, Gravenhurst, Ont., and Ripplis.

In the First World War he was awarded the Military Medal for bravery while serving with the 115th Battalion.

Well known in Maritime circles, Mr. Grimmer following his discharge in the First World War engaged in the family grocery business, and later held a position with the New Brunswick Liquor Commission. Following the Second World War he engaged in the fishing industry, and also had an insurance business.

He is survived by his wife, the former Dorothy Daye of Saint John. Also surviving are a sister, Mrs. Lloyd Murray of Charlottetown, and several nephews and nieces. Two brothers, Dr. Roy Grimmer of Long Island, N. Y. and G. Stillington Grimmer of St. Andrews predeceased him.
