Girl Guide News



Training for Guides and Brownie Leaders.

The course for Guides is now in its third week and on Monday evenings session the Brown Owls again outnumbered the Guide Leaders. How about a real crowd of all Leaders for the final session next Monday at Trinity Hall, 6.45 p.m. Coffee and cakes will be served at 8:30 by kind permission of our Provincial Commissioner Mrs. Gordon MacDonald. This meeting will be a review of Guide and Brownie work generally and is sure to contain something of interest to all. Mrs. Cudmore and Miss S. MacKinnon conducted the Guides class again and Mrs. C. Pickard, the Brown Owls.

I was in on the Brownie class this week and it was excellent and those not present really missed something. Mrs. Pickard had a way of explaining that was easy for one to assimilate and many worth while hints were given. She dealt with the work of a Golden Hand Brownie and each test was explained. At the beginning two easy games that could be well used for guides were taught. From experience I know that even guides like Brownie games. "Pop goes the Weasel" should have groups in a circle of four to six with one in the centre of each circle and one to remain outside in the middle of the groups. Groups dance around and sing "A penny for a spool of thread, A penny for a needle, That's the way the money goes, Pop goes the Weasel. At the word Pop the ones in the inner circle and the one outside have to run and try to reach inside the inner circle. The odd one out is left in the centre of the circle. The ones on the middle can be changed to give all a turn. This can also be played with two circles the inner smaller than the outer, one circle jiggling in a squatting position and the other dancing around, at the Pop the squatters jump up and start dancing and the dancers squat down. Another idea was the Magic Fish Pond.

All you need for this is your Magic Carpet of green or a Square of material or even paper with a hand mirror in the middle, the Brownie Owl and the Pack what she can see. This gives a chance for Brownies to use their imagination. Making paper Bunnies was another idea for an Easter party. A small prize of an Easter egg could be given for the best.

Mrs. Pickard emphasized that outside Guides must test for the Golden Hand, A Brown Owl may pass for the Golden Bar but not for the 1st Class test. The Leaders were encouraged to try for their Warrants. On returning to the Guides class I found Miss MacKinnon conducting a staking game. One Guide was placed with her back to the others who were in a line about 15 feet away, they had to creep up towards the animal, and if a sound was made the animal turned and the stalkers had to freeze in whatever position they were. The upright, crawl and other positions were explained and demonstrated. This can be fun at a Guide meeting and is good practice for later outdoor work.
