SIR MICHAEL AT BRISTOL.

Thinks That Britons Can Hold Their Own.

Wants Canada to Assist in Maintaining the Navy.

LONDON, Jan. 20.—Sir Michael Hicks-Beach, Chancellor of the Exchequer, speaking at Bristol last night ridiculed the notion of providing granaries, as has been suggested in some quarters. He said he was convinced that the British navy was strong enough to hold its own; and in any war England would have many friends ready to supply corn.

Referring to the coming estimates he said that these would show that the government was fully alive to keeping up the standard of the army and navy, though he declared it was not creditable to Canada or fair to English taxpayers that such a colony should practically contribute nothing to the naval defences of the Empire. He hoped that Canada would soon turn her attention to this matter, adding that he was convinced that if she did not, the day would come when she would have a rude awakening which would be entirely her own fault.

IMPORTANT AND SIGNIFICANT

Statement of Mr. Chamberlain.

It may be Necessary for Great Britain to "go it alone" in Respect to Turkey.

LONDON, Jan. 20.—Mr. Chamberlain, defending the government policy at Liverpool, last evening, against the attacks of the Liberals, and referring especially to the Armenian and Cretan question said the impotence of the European concert is a discredit to all Powers. The position is becoming intolerable and cannot be allowed to continue indefinitely, though there would be great risk in taking the alternative course. It may, however, be our duty—I hope it will not—to reserve our right and independence to take isolated action.

The Standard and Daily Mail comment editorially upon Chamberlain's statement, characterizing it as most important and significant.

MINING CERTIFICATES.

Personal Application Must be Made.

OTTAWA, Jan. 20.—It is officially announced that the Yukon mining certificates will be procurable in Montreal, Toronto, Winnipeg, Calgary, Edmonton, Prince Albert, Kamloops, Victoria and Vancouver, and in the Old Country at London, Liverpool, Glasgow and Dublin.

Personal application to a government official will be necessary, but the applicant must sign certificates in the official's presence.

Mr. Gladstone's Health.

LONDON, Jan. 20.—An official medical statement has been issued to the effect that there is no cause for alarm as to Mr. Gladstone's health, although the report admits it has not benefited as much as had been hoped at Cannes.

OTTAWA, Jan. 20.—Irish Catholic Liberals here have organized an "Edward Blake Club." They claim that the present government is not according them fair play in the matter of patronage.

LATEST NEWS BY WIRE AND MAIL.

LONDON, January 18.—The Right Hon. Sir Michael Hicks-Beach, chancellor of the exchequer, speaking at Swansea last night, echoed the declarations of Mr. Balfour, first lord of the treasury, on the Indian policy of the government, at Manchester, and said the government was determined even at the cost of war that the doors of Chinese commerce should not be shut to Great Britain.

CALCUTTA, Jan 18.—Sir William Lockhart, after completing the report on which he is engaged concerning the future Indian frontier and the means to be adopted, will return to England on three months leave. General Sir Lower Palmer will act during his absence, being succeeded in his present command by General Giles. The force will otherwise remain unchanged except for a temporary reorganization of the headquarters staff. General Power has been commander of the Punjab force since 1893. He entered the Indian army in 1857, and during the mutiny he served with Hodon's horse. In 1863 he was on the northwest frontier. He served in the Abyssinian war from 1867 to the end of 1868 was with the Duffin expedition in 1894 and commanded the Chuhills expedition. He served also during the Afghan war, 1878, and in the Soujan expedition in 1885. He received the rank of major-general in 1893.

WASHINGTON, D. C. Jan. 18.—Arrangements for the departure of the government relief expedition for the Klondyke are being pushed. Under date of January 17, Clifford Sifton, Canadian minister of the interior, wrote to Assistant Secretary McKeljohn as follows: "Referring to the conversation which passed between us on the subject of furnishing an escort for your relief expedition, I have given instructions that sufficient number of men be sent forward to Skaguay for the purpose, and I have no doubt they will be awaiting the arrival of your people on or before the first of February. May I ask if you will be good enough to advise me when your expedition is expected to embark for Skaguay, so that our arrangements may be made, if possible, in accord?"

In answer to an enquiry from Mr. McKeljohn as to the exact situation at Dawson, according to his reports, Mr. Sifton telegraphed the following Saturday evening: "My reports indicate no immediate danger of starvation at Dawson but great necessity for provisions being distributed between Fort Selkirk and Skaguay at various posts. Believe ice has formed all the way through. Our provisions are being pushed down by horses and dogs. Intend to keep supplies moving until water opens in the spring, to avoid possible disaster."

OTTAWA, Jan. 18.—The mining regulations which will be promulgated in a few days are a vast improvement on those of last August. The size of claims is increased from 100 to 250 feet frontage, and while a royalty of 10 per cent. is retained no royalty will be charged on any claim where the annual return is less than \$1,500 a year. A miner's license system is adopted. The fee will be \$10, and the cost of recording the claim is reduced to \$15, with \$15 for an annual renewal. The dredging license for rivers in the five-mile section is \$500 per mile yearly.
