

Labor Board Discrimination Of Quebec Unions Charged

OTTAWA (CP) — Creditite Leader Real Caouette and Gilles Gregoire (Ind — Lapointe) charged in the Commons that the Canada Labor Relations Board discriminates against Quebec unions.

They criticized the board for rejecting applications by the Quebec-based Confederation of National Trade Unions to represent certain CBC and CPR employees in Quebec. The board so far has refused to break country-wide bargaining units.

Mr. Caouette and his former deputy said this attitude is unfair to French-speaking workers and a violation of the freedom of association.

Mr. Gregoire introduced an amendment to reduce Labor Minister Nicholson's salary to \$1 unless he directed the board to allow workers to "make a free choice between unions."

MOTION REJECTED

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Bernan Batten after Liberal, Conservative and New Democratic MPs objected. Mr. Batten ruled that ministers' salaries are set by law and cannot be amended during study of departmental estimates.

Rene Tremblay, former postmaster-general, interjected that the amendment amounted to blackmail.

Mr. Gregoire said a cabinet committee was set up under Trade Minister Winters last April to study the CNTU's complaints, but nothing had been done.

He also disliked Canadian Labor Congress having two board representatives and the CNTU only one.

Bryce Mackasey, parliamentary secretary to Mr. Nicholson and MP for Montreal Verdun, said it was a "terrible situation when we have to get into the racial cry" on the labor situation.

J. A. Mongrain (Ind—Trois-Rivieres) said the majority should rule in union certification.

Soviets Fire Huge Blast Undergrond

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Soviet Union set off Thursday the biggest underground nuclear blast ever recorded, American officials reported.

The U.S. Atomic Energy Commission said seismic signals showed a detonation in the intermediate-to-high-yield range — meaning it approached the equivalent of 1,000,000 tons of TNT.

Intermediate yield in the AEC's terminology covers the range from 200,000 to 1,000,000 tons.

By way of comparison, the atmospheric nuclear shot announced Thursday by China was recorded in the low to low-intermediate range, or possibly as little as one-fiftieth the force of the Soviet explosion. Low yield is 20,000 tons or less, about the force of the Hiroshima bomb.

None of the U.S. underground tests at the AEC's Nevada proving grounds has been reported at more than half the force of the Soviet shot.

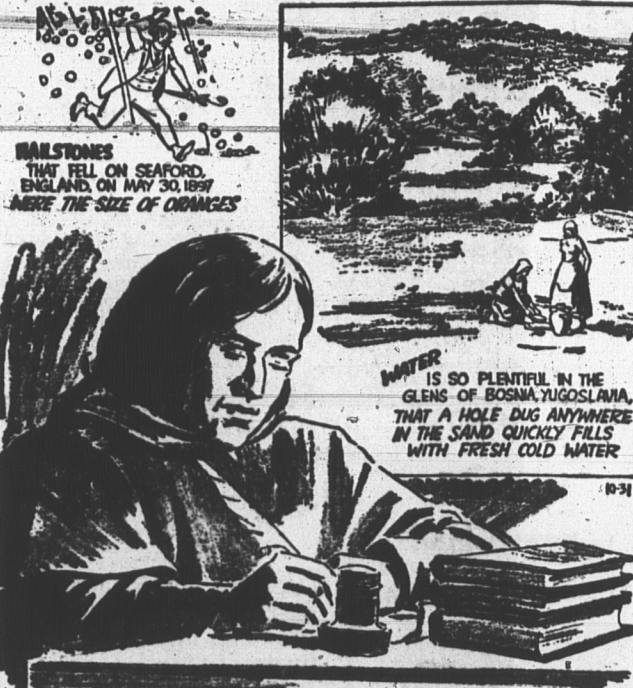
The earth signals came from the area of the Soviet test area of Novya Zemlya, a desolate northern island.
