"BARRISTER," which was foaled in 1878,
was exhibited at many of the leading Shows
in the Old Country, and never left the ring
without a ribbon. He on this side has com-
peted in New Brunswick, Nova Scotia and
State of Maine, and was always placed first.
At our Provincial Exhibitions he has never
been beaten, excepting by "Lucky Lad."
His stock is more favorably known in the
Maritime Provinces and State of Maine, both
as good workers and prize winners than any
other horse of the draught breed.
"LUCKY LAD" was foaled in 1884, and
was a short leg horse at the great Glasgow
Spring Stallion Show, in March, 1887. He

The House, Yesterday.

THE debate on the Address was continued
last afternoon and evening. In the after-
noon the speakers were Messrs. James R.
McLean, John McLean, McLellan, and Bell—
the latter gentleman having the floor when
recess was taken at six o'clock. There was
a small attendance of spectators during the
afternoon proceedings; but in the evening
the attendance was very nearly as large as
on the preceding night. Mr. Bell resumed
the debate shortly after eight o'clock, and
continued speaking until ten o'clock. He
wandered over our claims against the Do-
minion, taking exception to the manner in
which they were pressed, and touched lightly
upon the consolidated statutes and other
matters.

He dealt, however, at considerable length
with the recent defalcations in the Land
Office, with the Commissioner and with
the Commission. As with index finger
pointed and head poised, he laid down
what he imagined was the law and the
gospel of that branch of the public service,
he acquitted himself in a manner satis-
factory to himself. The only thing he
neglected referring to was the "sawyer"
evidence given by himself before the Com-
mission; this his modesty evidently forbade
his doing. Mr. Shaw followed in one of
the best Parliamentary speeches made by
him. He began by twitting the last
speaker upon his wandering pro-
clivities, after which he referred to the
great importance of the agricultural in-
dustry, saying it was the duty of the Govern-
ment, in the future as in the past, to give
that industry all the assistance and en-
couragement in its power. While speaking
of the Stock Farm, and the importance
of keeping it provided with good animals,
he referred to a complaint made by one
hon. member, that the people of the
western end of the Island were not getting
their just share of the animals imported by
the Government, and suggested that the
hon. junior member for Fort Augustus send
up some of the cattle bought by him in Fort
Augustus during the recent election cam-
paign! He also thought it would be well
if the Government were to import several
hundreds of bushels of seed oats from the
Old Country for distribution among the
farmers of the Province—in order that they
might be better enabled to improve the
quality of their oats. Referring to the
Exhibitions, he spoke highly of the bill
passed last session, and of the increased aid
given for exhibitions in Prince and King's
Counties. He next dealt with the pressing
of our claims against the Dominion, and
with the charge made by the Opposition
that the Government had stolen their
policy. This was the first he ever heard
of the Oppositionists having anything like
a policy to steal. Indeed, he thought it would
be about as easy to steal the breeches of a
Highlandman as to steal the policy of the
Opposition! He then proceeded to deal
with the Land Office defalcations and with
the speeches made in reference thereto by
the hon. junior member for Fort Augustus
and the hon. member for Bedouque, showing
clearly the fallacy of the arguments and
contentions of these gentlemen. The de-
bate was continued by Messrs. Sinclair
and Bentley until nearly midnight, when
the House adjourned.

BEARS KILLED.—At St. Margaret's Bay,
N. S., on Friday last, A. Boutillier, G. John-
stone and C. Ryan succeeded in killing four
bears and capturing two alive. The men
were in the woods lumbering when they came
across a family of bears, two old ones and
four cubs. The dogs succeeded in rooting
the animals from their dens and the fring
began. Boutillier and Ryan shot one of the
old bears, and Johnstone laid low two of the
young ones. The other two cubs were cap-
tured. Friday evening the cubs were being
hawked about the city seeking purchasers.
The men will get \$16 for the skulls of the
dead bears. The heaviest of the animals was
a regular Jumbo, tipping the scales at 598
pounds. The skins of the two old bears were
sold to an officer.
