

Toronto Defeats Lions; Edmonton Ties Calgary

ARGONAUTS 29 LIONS 27

TORONTO (CP) — A third-down gamble late in the fourth quarter Sunday carried Toronto Argonauts to a 29-27 victory over British Columbia Lions in a Canadian Football League interlocking contest.

Despite the victory—Toronto's second against seven losses—the Argonauts remained in the Eastern Football Conference cellar. The loss also left B.C. in the Western Football Conference basement with a 2-9 record.

Argos' started towards the victory after the Lions had moved into a 27-21 lead early in the final quarter. Quarterback Eagle Day's passing moved Toronto to the Lions 19, but the Argos were stalled in their first two attempts for a first down.

With four yards to go, Argos gambled and Day passed to Mel Profit for the first down. Dave Thelen went up centre for two yards and Day passed to Bobby Taylor for the touchdown.

John Volunas' second convert gave Argos the winning point. Dave Mann added another point on a 65-yard single with two minutes remaining.

Argos' other touchdowns were scored by Thelen, Billy Martin and Jim Rowntree. Volunas also kicked a single and Mann finished with two singles.

Fullback Larry Eilmes paced British Columbia's attack with two touchdowns with Bill Munsey and Sonny-Homer getting the others. Billy Mitchell kicked three converts.

EDMONTON 18 CALGARY 18

By DON MacLACHLAN CALGARY (CP) — Calgary Stampeders kicked away a 10-0 first-quarter lead Saturday but rebounded with a last-play touchdown to tie Edmonton Eskimos 18-18 in a Western Football Conference game.

Two passes by quarterback Jerry Keeling took Stampeders to the Edmonton 13-yard line with eight seconds remaining and he found Terry Evanshen alone on the goal line to complete the drive. Larry Robinson's convert provided the tying point.

All of Edmonton's points were set up by Stampeders errors. Eskimos benefitted from 12 penalties, four pass interceptions and two fumbles, both inside the Calgary 17-yard line.

Howard Starks went 40 yards for Calgary's opening touchdown, the club's first on the ground in 10 games. Robinson converted and kicked a field goal and single to complete scoring.

Butch Pressley and tackle Ed Poles scored Edmonton's touchdowns, both after fumbles. Tommy Joe Coffey converted both and kicked a single. Randy Kerbow punted for three singles.

HAMILTON 29 SASKATCHEWAN 7

By JIM CRERAR HAMILTON (CP) — Saskatchewan Roughriders take on Ottawa Rough Riders in Ottawa tonight with star fullback George Reed a doubtful starter.

Reed, key man in Saskatchewan's offence, picked up a charleyhorse in his right thigh as the Roughriders absorbed a 29-7 pasting by Hamilton Tiger-Cats Saturday in a Canadian Football League interlocking game.

Saskatchewan maintained its hold on first place in the Western Conference despite the loss while the victory moved the Ticats within two points of leading Ottawa in the Eastern Conference.

Reed rushed for 33 yards in five carries during the first quarter, but had to be taken from the game in the early stages of the second.

Willie Bethes, Dave Fleming, Gerry McDougall and Bobby Kuntz got the Hamilton touchdowns. Don Suterin converted all four and added a single in the fourth quarter when a 38-yard field goal attempt went wide.

Saskatchewan was shut out until the final minute when Jim Worden gathered in a 31-yard pass from Ron Lancaster for a touchdown which Jack Abdenschan converted.

American Engineer Wins Canadian Race

MOSPORT, Ont. (CP)—Mark Donahue of Stony Brook, N.Y., today won the Canadian Grand Prix for sports cars in a Chevrolet-powered Lola T70.

Second was Phil Hill of Santa Monica, Calif., in a Chevrolet-powered Chaparral.

The race was over 212 miles, 85 laps around the 2.5-mile road circuit. Donahue took at least \$6,500 in prize money and the Pepsi-Cola Trophy.

The race was hard on the favorites. Only 11 of the 30 starters were still running at the finish.

For the first time since the Mosport track opened in 1961, a major race had to be restarted. A jumble at the first corner in the initial lap left cars scattered across the track.

When it was restarted, four cars were so badly damaged they could not race. They included the Lola T70 of John Surtees of England, 1964 world champion and the race favorite.

The first races in the series were at St. Jovite, Que., and Bridgehampton, N.Y. Remaining races will be at Laguna Seca and Riverside, Calif., and Las Vegas, Nevada.

It was the first major race in Mosport's six-year history that had to be restarted. After the initial pile-up following the standing grid start, drivers were set off in single file from their original grid positions.

As part of the six-race Can-Am series, Donahue's victory was worth nine points giving him a total of 11.

Behind him are Amon and McLaren with 10 points each, and Surtees, Gurney and Hill with nine-apiece.

SYDNEY (CP) — A 17-year-old high school student is the new Canadian Lightweight Boxing champion.

Ronnie Sampson of Sydney River, N.S., won the crown with a unanimous decision over Willie Williams of New Victoria, N.S., in the 12-round title bout here Saturday night.

Williams, 25, announced his retirement from the ring following the fight.

The Lightweight title was left vacant when Tyrone Gardner, also of Sydney River, retired last month. Sampson opened an early lead over Williams, but the latter's experience paid off and the fight went the full 12 rounds. The only knockdown came in the seventh round when Williams had to take the mandatory eight count.
