

SIR ROBERT HODGSON.

SIR ROBERT HODGSON died at his residence, Keswick House, about 8 o'clock last evening. The event will be mourned by many loving kinsfolk and sincere friends.

The first symptom of the coming of the stroke under which he fell—the beginning of the end—was noticed about a fortnight ago, when he lost the use of the thumb and forefinger of his right hand.

SIR ROBERT HODGSON was the eldest son of Robert Hodgson, Esquire, who was at one time Speaker of the House of Assembly.

His mother was a daughter of Lieut. Colonel Robinson, of the South Carolina Royalist Regiment. He was born in the year 1798, and was educated in Charlottetown, and at King's College, Windsor.

He studied law, we believe, in Halifax, at the office of Mr. Robie, and was admitted to the Bar of Nova Scotia on the 26th of October, 1819.

In the year 1822 he was admitted to the Bar of Prince Edward Island, and began practice in Charlottetown as an Advocate. In 1827 he married Miss Fannie McDonnell, daughter of Captain Ranald MacDonnell, of the Glengarry Highlanders, and Town Major.

His wife died on the 2nd of May, 1832, and he has been a widower ever since. Sir Robert's public career began with his election as a representative of this city in the year 1824.

Mr. Johnson, at that time Attorney General, died on the 18th May, 1828; and on the following day Sir Robert (then Mr.) Hodgson was appointed acting Attorney General.

Provincial Synod.

MONTREAL, Sept. 11.

The Marriage question occupied the whole of the afternoon session. Able speeches were made against the projected legislation by Canon Brigstock, Rev. Mr. Darling and J. E. Carry.

Last night the reception held by the Bishop of Montreal was attended by a very large number of delegates.

Hon. Mr. Vail reported, as Chairman of Committee, that the title of "The Church in Canada" shall hereafter be "The Church of England in Canada."

Mr. T. White, in an interesting speech on missions, in which he predicted that in less than a quarter of a century the population would be greater to the West than in the East of Lake Superior.

Mr. Brydges, who had travelled over a large portion of this territory lately, concurred in this opinion.

Mr. Parkins electrified the house by a missionary speech, in which he declared that the wealthy city of Montreal did not spend an adequate amount on the missions of the Church.

Rev. D. C. Moore's resolution with reference to appointments to rectories, parishes and missions was, after a short discussion, withdrawn.

The resolution of both houses with reference to bringing to the notice of the Dominion Government the injustice intended to be perpetrated on this Church by excluding its members from the designation of Catholic, in enumerating the ensuing census, passed unanimously.

The discussion on the temperance question, after a lively debate, closed by a resolution declaring adherence to the Church of England Temperance Society.
