Cold Spell Delights Tignish As Outdoor Rink Sees Action

TIGNISH — After a mild spell of weather and much disappointment by the younger generation, Jack Frost smiled on the Village of Tignish this week, allowing the Tignish Sports Recreation Association to open the outdoor skating rink, Tuesday evening.

The rink put in top shape by a hard working board of directors since November, has recently had installed a new lighting system that does much to add to the attraction of the village at night. Changes have been made to the dressing rooms, ticket office and well-stocked canteen.

Plans are well underway for a public address system, the first to be installed on any outdoor rink in the community.

A total of 12 hockey teams are heading a tight schedule, sponsored by the association.

New hockey equipment has been made available through the association, which plans to dole out to keep the younger village well occupied with winter sports and recreation.

David Harper, part-time sports director with the association and physical instructor at the Tignish Regional High School, along with his brother Philip, instructor at the Elementary School, and Gerald Kough, a past sports instructor, with others will coach and supervise the skating.

Supervised skating for youngsters and teen-agers will be extended throughout all of the winter.

And any help freely given by adults will be gratefully appreciated by the association, whose main concern is the welfare of the youth of Tignish.

The success of the skating part of the program will be left to the weatherman.
