

City Basketball League Finals Start Tonight

LONDON (AP)—Beau Prince II, owned and trained in France, became a firm second favorite behind Acropolis at a betting call-over on the 175-year-old classic Epsom Derby Wednesday night.

The derby will be run over a mile and a half May 25—the eve of Britain's general election.

Acropolis, owned by 83-year-old Alice (Lady) Derby, went out slightly in the betting from 5-1 to 8-1. Beau Prince II, trained in France and owned by M. G. Wildenstein, shortened from 100-7 to 100-8 and became second favorite.

STALLION ENROLMENT

According to the provisions of the Stallion Enrolment Act all stallions two years old and over, standing for service in this Province, must be enrolled in the records of the Department of Agriculture. Horses offering for service must be inspected and graded and carry an inspection certificate. Applications for enrolment and inspection should be made immediately.

Applications for enrolment should be accompanied with the required fee of Two Dollars (\$2.00) and should include name of horse, breed, age, colour description and registration number, if horse is registered.

Stallion owners who use horses for service not enrolled or inspected, or in grades not authorized by the Act will be subject to the penalty provisions of the Act. Only horses enrolled, graded and authorized by the Department of Agriculture will be permitted to travel for public service. All horses that have graded "out" will not be permitted to stand or travel for service.

Former Dodger Pitches Baltimore Team To First Victory Of The Baseball Season

Erv Palica, who fretted in the Brooklyn doghouse for years, gave Baltimore its first victory of the season after six defeats Wednesday by defeating New York Yankees 6-3 with relief help from Ray Moore, another former Dodger. Hal Smith, rookie catcher, who was traded to the Orioles in the Bob Turley deal, helped ruin his old owners with a two-run homer off reliever Art Schalklock in the fifth. Smith drove in half the Orioles runs.

In the National League the second place Milwaukee Braves grabbed a 9-5 triumph from Chicago Cubs in the only scheduled afternoon game. Chicago at Detroit was rained out in the junior circuit.

Four night games were on tap. Boston was at Washington in the American league while New York at Pittsburgh, Philadelphia at Brooklyn and Cincinnati at St. Louis were scheduled in the National League.

Bobby Thomson, Milwaukee's big "big" man, crashed a grand slam homer and just missed another in the Braves victory. Thomson who was drydrocked by a broken leg last season, hammered his big blow off Cub loser Sam Jones in the second inning and hit a bases-loaded single in the sixth for five runs batted out. Brave's righthander Lew Burdette notched his second victory of the season, though nicked for two homers and quit in the ninth with the bases loaded and two out.

Umpire Robinson came in against big Hank Sauer and struck out the Bruin cleanup man to end a three-run inning.

Catcher Harry Chitt belted a bases-empty homer for the first time in his third and Dee Fondy smashed his third homer with a man aboard in the ninth. Against the Oriole's, Bob Grimm failed two innings and required 55 hits to retire two men. It was his second straight loss. He won 20 last year.

BROOKLYN (AP)—Brooklyn Dodgers, although held to three hits, won their ninth consecutive game Wednesday night defeating Philadelphia Phillies, 3-2, to equal the modern major league record for the longest winning streak at the start of the season.

The second Brooklyn hit, a two-out bases-loaded single by Gil Hodges off relief pitcher Lynn Lovenguth, drove in the tying and winning runs in the seventh inning when the Dodgers got all their runs.

The loss was charged to Steve Ridzik although he gave up only a sixth-inning double by Sandy Amoros. The young righthander helped us win four National Hockey League championships and two Stanley Cups. He was right here cheering for us all through the Montreal series and we're happy he is with us at this celebration.
