

Four Fine Classes In Colt Futurities

For the P.E.I. 1952 Colt Futurities to be held on Sept. 10 the Secretary, Bill Gillespie, announces four fine classes. The entry list for these four classes will appear in an advertisement in this paper.

There will be a two-year-old pace; a two-year-old trot; a three-year-old pace, and a three-year-old trot. There will be great rivalry between horses from different parts of the province, and an extra bit of excitement contributed by entries from the mainland.

Every one of the four classes will have smart performers, who have already proven their ability. There are also the unknown horses who will spice matters up, because any one of them may bring a surprise. All of the entries of course are Maritime bred, most of them raised, trained, and in some cases, to be driven by their owners.

In the two-year-old pace, Alfred Pineau of Rustico will start "Bob Clegg", and there will be quite a following from that part of the country to see this two-year-old. That good horseman Randall MacDonald, Montague, will be in the same event with "Ethel M.". From Halifax will come "Pepper Shaker" and "Edgar D.", both owned by C. L. Dauphinee. Alberton will be represented by "Plicka McElwyn", said to have worked a very fast mile recently. The fast two-year-old pacer "Bell Hop B." and the good pacer "Roy Harvester" will carry Charlottetown hopes in this struggle between the Maritimes' best two-year-old pacers.

The two-year-old trot brings together five good youngsters, four owned by Charlottetown stables, and one from Fredericton. N. B. "Robert Lee" will carry the colors of Mrs. James Poulton, Charlottetown; the Justamere Stable owned by Dr. R. F. Seaman, has entered "Just A Squire"; Pound Bros. of Charlottetown will send "Skimo" to the post, and Bill MacAusland, also of Charlottetown, will start "Clever Palle". The Fredericton entry is "Lakeburn", owned by J. T. Atkins and H. O. Downey.

Clancy To Coach Pittsburg Club

PITTSBURGH, Sept. 7 — (AP)—King Clancy signed Saturday for another year as coach of the American Hockey League Pittsburg Hornets, a farm club of Toronto. Maple Leafs, it was learned here.

Clancy led the Hornets to their initial A. M. L. championship and Calder Cup title in his first season last winter. Terms of the new contract were not disclosed.

"Skimo" may rate as the favorite in this race, but any one of the other four may upset the dope. It will be an all-Island tussle in the three-year-old trot, but the competition will be none the less keen on this account. Dr. J. A. Delaney of Summerside has "Sandy's Squire" ready for this event; Lorne Kelly of Southport will pin his hopes on "Tara Littledale"; Horace Willis of Charlottetown is starting "Pal Reynolds"; and Geo. MacDonald, Mermaid, P.E.I., has entered "Ginger Worthy".

In the three-year-old pace, there will be nine starters, and numbered among them, some of the most promising pacers developed in recent years. Mr. Frank A. Ryder of Moncton will be here with "Royal Bank", said to be one of the best three-year-olds ever developed in the East, and James W. O'Brien, of Elmsdale, will be on hand with "Just Rilia" who was a winner during Exhibition week in the fast time of 2:15 and a fraction. Montague has a real threat in "Vernita Pearl", owned by the A. & L. Stables.

Pre-racing information rates the above mentioned trio as the pick of the lot, but there are six other good three-year-olds in this event, and none of them can be counted out until the race is over. It will be a great card of racing, and when the evening is over, horse followers will have had a peak into the future, and a better appreciation of the real job some of our Island breeders are doing to keep horse racing alive in this province.

HEAVENLY HIGHWAYS

The bird watcher's thrill of spring is welcoming old friends as they arrive from their winter vacation and spotting something he has never before identified. In autumn the heavenly highways are again in use, and full of interest. A few species, as Swifts and Shrikes, travel alone, but most go in the company of either their own kind or those with similar habits. Some of these flocks reach enormous proportions. From a strategic point migrating Crows may be seen flying in a band 3-4 mile wide and taking an entire day to pass. Or there may be as many as 800 Warblers, comprising seven or eight varieties, grouped together, probably for protection against larger birds of prey, such as Hawks.

Yet these predators also travel in unusually large flocks. As with other feathered folk, they keep rules, so that bird watchers know exactly what positions to occupy in order to have the best view of this exciting spectacle. The majority of small birds move in the hours of darkness, but Hawks, which are daylight travellers, give the observers a much better chance. When migration is at its height, it is not uncommon for five or six thousand to pass overhead in a single day.

Speed also varies enormously. The Duck Hawk, or Peregrine Falcon, cruises at 60 miles an hour. On the other hand, some Flycatchers cover little more than 10 miles.

Certain species, as Cardinals and Grouse, remain where they were born. It is uncertain just how far from home Blue Jays ever go, but it is undoubtedly a very short distance. Most birds travel hundreds of miles every year. The Arctic Tern should be given first prize for long migrations, because it nests near the North Pole, crosses the Atlantic in the autumn, and continues south to take a short holiday in the Antarctic before it is time to return.

The Golden Plover, also summering in the Arctic, spends the winter 2,000 miles away in the pampas of Argentina. But the most extraordinary feat is performed by its young ones. Adults travel south some weeks ahead of their offspring, use a highway that takes them across Labrador, through Nova Scotia, and then
