

Brooks Blank Braves 3-0

By ED WILKS Associated Press Staff Writer Big Don Newcombe hummed that one for 10 strikeouts and a four-hitter Thursday as the Brooklyn Dodgers belted first place Milwaukee 3-0 and compressed the National League race again while second place Cincinnati bashed the New York Giants 10-2.

Carl Furillo and Roy Campanella homered off Ray Croce for Newk's 16th victory that cut Milwaukee's lead over the third-place world champions to two games and sliced the Braves' edge over the Redlegs to one game.

It was the fifth defeat in the last six games for the Braves, who were riding high with a 5 1/2-game huge job a week ago.

St. Louis dumped Pittsburgh to an eighth straight defeat, 7-5, in the only other NL game scheduled.

Cerda Takes Lead In Tam O'Shanter

CHICAGO (AP) — Straight-shooting Antonio Cerda of Buenos Aires hit every fairway and one-putted five greens Thursday to shatter Tam O'Shanter's par with a 34-34-67 and take the early first round lead of the all-American golf tournament.

Half the field of 156 pros, including many of the favorites, was still on the 6,915 yard course in dawn-to-dusk firing when the 34-year-old Cerda completed his charge of smashing the 36-36-72 regulation.

Cerda was making his fourth start in the Tam O'Shanter jam-bore, whose all-American section carries a total of \$30,000 in cash with \$3,420 going to the men pro winner.

That Word 'Amateur' Again

The touchy question of "amateurism" has risen to its head once again in connection with the olympic games scheduled for Melbourne, Australia, in 1956.

Just why this "intend to remain" clause was ever put in the rules is a matter for close scrutiny. It smacks of the old school amateur's attitude towards professionals in general which seems to be not so much spiteful as it is resentful. In this day and age, competitors in general are nothing more than athletes who have not enough ability to become professionals.

We can readily see why the olympic committee would wish to restrict the olympics to amateurs but we can't understand why athletes should have to compete at the expense of depriving themselves of a livelihood doing the thing they know best whether it be basketball, or track and field or boxing or anything else. It is an incredibly stupid ruling but nothing more than what we have become accustomed to from olympic committees.

We dare say that the results of this ruling will not be as drastic now as they would have been many years ago. The only person who really knows what he intends at some future time is the individual making the plans. So the only deterring factor on an athlete signing a card when he fully intends to turn professional a day after the olympic is conscience aren't what they used to be.

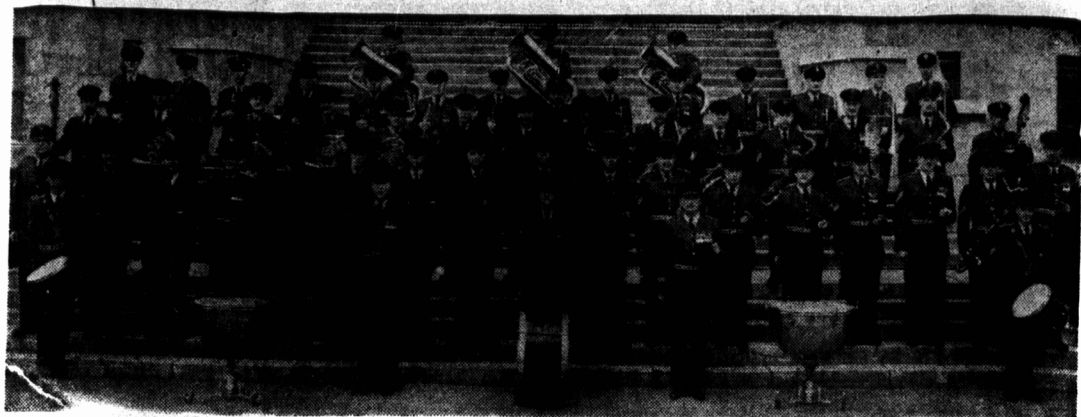
