recognizes that the federal government has the right to make equalization payments among the provinces in order to maintain national standards in all parts of Canada.

"Ontario respects the primacy of the federal government in the field of economic policy for the benefit of the whole country," he said.

"In my opinion, the combination of a bicultural country and a national economy diluted into regional economies would effectively destroy any chance of maintaining a united Canada."

He said the people of Ontario would go a long way to recognize the special status of Quebec in terms of language and culture, but they could not accept a federal system that was not based on a single national economy.

Mr. Robarts stressed the need for economic consultation. No longer would Ontario accept "any policy decisions made by the federal government that affect matters under our jurisdiction unless we have been extended the common courtesy of prior consultation."

Dealing with constitutional amendments, he said no change to the British North America Act should violate Quebec's special status. The crux of the problem fac-

Government Is Asked To Buy Land For Park

The provincial government has been urged by the Eastern Kings Board of Trade to buy land in Kings County so that "the second national park in this province" can be established in Eastern Kings.

A resolution to this effect was given Tourist Development Minister Lloyd MacPhail yesterday by representatives of the board, including president Joseph Galant and Wesley Fraser, a director.

Mr. MacPhail is reported to have told the board representatives that establishment of a second national park in the province is "a federal matter."

It is understood that if the federal government decides to establish a second national park in the province, the land involved must be handed over free to Ottawa by the province.

According to the trade board, the establishment of a second park in Eastern Kings would bring tremendous economic benefits to this area.

SUPERR BEACH
It is suggested that the area from Basin Head around to North Lake is "one of the most scenic and picturesque areas in the province, mainly due to the many miles of superb beach front in the area."

The board points out that private purchase of land in the suggested park site could deprive the public from beach use.

Other points mentioned by the board are that the presence of tuna in adjacent waters could lure sportsmen; a park in the area would enable tourists travelling by Wood Islands to make their first stay in Kings County; the majority of the people in the area favor a second national park.
