Communist Infiltration Angers Kenya's Gov't

NAIROBI (AP) — A cabinet minister said Friday Kenya "didn't fight the British so we might import the yellow fellow to take over our country." This reference to the Chinese Communists brought cheers from members of Parliament. "He may not come in the straight-forward manner of old-style gunboat diplomacy," declared Joseph Otiende, minister of health and housing. "But his is a more sinister way and that's by influencing people's minds. Such is the danger to this country today."

Thus Otiende seemed to take issue with Defence Minister Njoroge Mungai on the question of a Communist conspiracy. Mungai told Parliament the intelligence service has nothing to show that Communist arms are being smuggled in to overthrow the government.

Debate was on a motion presented by back-bencher Thomas Malinda claiming there was evidence of a flow of Communist arms into Kenya and asking for a government inquiry.

There have been numerous reports of Chinese Communist subversion in East Africa, but Malinda did not name the source of the arms. It remained for Otiende to mention the Chinese with his reference to the yellow fellow.

Mungai told Parliament the army and police are ready to meet any threat of revolution. Ronald Ngala, leader of the opposition Kenya African Democratic Union before the party voluntarily dissolved, read from a pamphlet he identified as "coming from the East" which warned revolution would spread to Kenya.

Ngala said the pamphlet was addressed to "militants of Africa" and "these militants are the people who are smuggling these things."

Hottest Issue In Years Faces Que. Government

QUEBEC (CP) — Broad reservations in Quebec about the Favreau-Fulton formula, and stiff Union Nationale opposition to it, have put the Lesage government on the defensive and made the constitution question one of the hottest issues here in five years.

The problem was expected to be a thorny one but the government apparently did not feel it would develop into the hot potato it has. A few weeks ago, Premier Jean Lesage laughed off a Union Nationale suggestion that a referendum be held. He said the issue was too complex for the average voter.

This left the premier open to criticism, and resulted in a Union Nationale vow to fight the formula to the death.

Speculation now is that the Lesage government will carry out a quiet survey to find out how Quebecers feel about the issue, followed possibly by a blitz campaign to put it across.

Government sources say the government firmly intends to see the resolution, which asks the Queen to ratify the Favreau-Fulton formula, passed.

The premier evidently has been piqued by reports that criticism of the formula, mainly from political and intellectual quarters, and the shaky position of the federal Liberal government have raised doubts.

Reports that the cabinet last week decided to sound out the public also have annoyed the

premier, who is reported to be angrily searching for the source of the leak.

The resolution has been on the order paper since the session began Jan. 22. This prevents discussion in the House before debate on it begins.

However, outside the House, the Union Nationale has been attacking the formula as a rigid one that would enslave Quebec in a constitution dominated by the other provinces.

Everyone from Real Caouette's Creditistes to Robert Cliche's New Democrats have chimed in, along with French-language editorial writers and university professors.

Why couldn't the government, with its heavy majority in the elected legislature, simply have passed the resolution? The hitch is a bill to restrict the powers of the Legislative Council, Quebec's Upper House.

It must be passed before the resolution can be adopted, and the council has sent the bill back to the Lower House with heavy amendments.

HAS RECOURSE TO QUEEN

The government says that under the British North America Act it now has recourse to the Queen if the council blocks legislation passed by the elected House.

But once the Favreau-Fulton formula is ratified, this recourse would disappear and the appointed members of the Union Nationale-dominated council could block laws forever.

"I think that after Easter we will be able to bring the Upper House to its senses," the premier said in the Assembly Tuesday.

In past disputes with the council, the Liberal government has brandished public opinion. This leads to speculation that between now and Easter, the government will counter-attack critics of the formula.

Premier Lesage is to make a speech on the constitution April 10 in Montreal, and this could set the tone of his appeal for public support.

One argument, observers say, will be that under the Favreau-Fulton formula, the constitution won't be any more rigid than it is now and the formula will open the way for changes Quebec wants. The Favreau-Fulton formula provides for the transfer of final amending powers from the British Parliament and also sets out the precise terms by which the constitution can be amended in Canada.

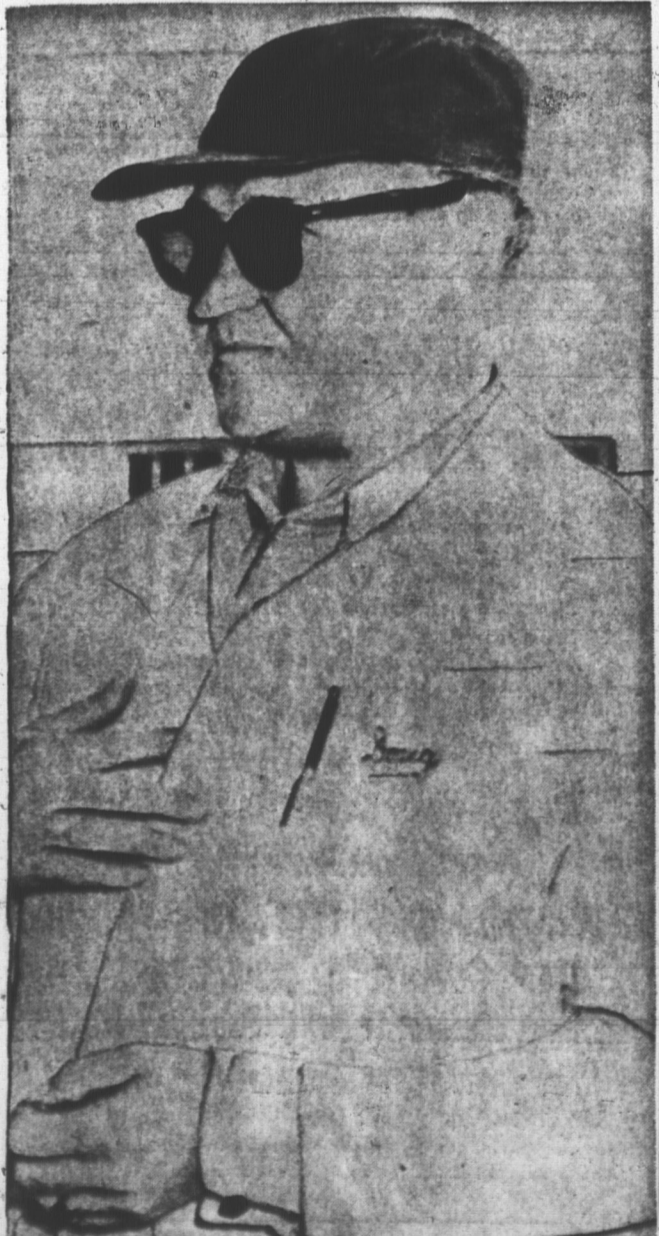
PARTY GETS SUPPORT

No matter how the issue turns out, it has given the Union Nationale its best moments in five dark years. The party finds its positions supported to some degree by French-language intellectuals.

Meanwhile, Premier Lesage has been criticized for his off-hand remark that the issue was too deep for the average man.

Dissension in the Union Nationale has evaporated as the issue has developed, and last month at the party's first real congress since it was formed in 1935, Mr. Johnson won solid support.

Besides arousing interest as a result of the convention and obtaining the "renewal" of its structures, the party evidently has won support from youth and intellectuals on its constitutional stand.
