Official NHL Scorers Show No Favoritism—Campbell

WHEATLEY Canadian Press Staff Writer MONTREAL (CP) — If anybody thinks the National Hockey League's official scorers indulge in favoritism by awarding or disallowing assists, they are 100 per cent wrong, NHL president Clarence Campbell said Friday. "There is no single evidence of bias whatever on the part of scorers," said Campbell. "I have records over the last 12 years to prove it." Campbell's statements came during an interview when the current close race for the scoring title was discussed and it was suggested some people—players, coaches or fans—might get a bit jittery over the scoring. "I think the scorers are doing a fabulous job," said Campbell. "Once in a while there might be some difference of opinion over generosity or niggardliness in awarding assists, not only to the home club but to the visiting club. The difference arises mostly in connection with the visiting club. The scorers are not as

acquainted with the visitors. They see them on the ice only seven times a season, but see the home players 35 times. We take that into consideration. "Each year the over-all advantage on assists to the home club is approximately 10 per cent, which is very modest considering the total number of goals. There are 1,000 to 1,100 goals scored a season, with about 1,800 assists." PRODUCES FIGURES Campbell said that as of "this minute" the ratio is 1.60. To show the uniformity, he produced figures for each quarter of the current season. They showed ratios of 1.59 the first quarter, also 1.59 the second and 1.60 the third quarter. The average ratio for home teams was 1.64, 1.69 and 1.68; for visiting teams, 1.54, 1.50 and 1.53. "We keep close check and send out information each quarter to all scorers," said Campbell. "They are then in a position to know the ratio relationships of the various scorers. Campbell said that mistakes of course are made. An assist might be wrongly credited "but this is generally sorted out." Also, a

Favored Western Rinks Come Through Twice

QUEBEC (CP) — The three favored western rinks rolled to their second consecutive victories in the Canadian curling championships Monday night, but only after Ontario threw a mighty fright into Manitoba. Dr. Dick Bird's Wapalpeg Elmwood rink had a substantial 13-5 lead built up by the ninth end but Ted Sellers' Unionville, Ont., entry stormed back with seven in the three final ends before bowing 13-12. Saskatchewan had an easy time with a less-experienced Newfoundland rink and rolled to an 18-9 win. The Maritimers tried to match Regina's running game but lacked their accuracy. Herb Olson's highly-regarded Alberta rink pecked at the score sheet throughout the game to down a stubborn Prince Edward Island team 13-5. Alberta led 4-3 at the end of the fourth then scored in the five following ends to pull away. THRILLING MATCHES The other two games were the most thrilling of the second round.

New Brunswick and Northern Ontario played a see-saw game with Northern Ontario leading 9-7 with three ends to play but three straight singles pulled the game out of the fire for New Brunswick and gave them a 10-9 win.
