## NOTES FROM THE CAPITAL.

Atlantic Mail Service.

### HALIFAX TO BE A PORT OF CALL

But there is Still a Hitch in the Matter.

OTTAWA, Nov. 3.—At a meeting of the Cabinet, yesterday the conclusion was reached to give the contract for the Atlantic Mail Service to the Beaver Line. The company is to receive the full amount of the subsidy named, \$126,000 per annum or £500 per trip and give a weekly service between St. John and Liverpool calling at Halifax both ways. The \$20,000 voted for a fortnightly freight service is embedded in the larger amount. The company undertakes to perform the service under ten days and will place a new steamer on the line. The company has accepted the Government's conditions, provided it can come to terms with the Canadian Pacific Railway Company, and here is the sticking point. It is understood that the Beaver Line arrangements with the big railway are for a direct service to and from St. John. If the railway declines to allow freight to be delayed by vessels calling at Halifax, the Beaver Line may have to back out of the arrangement with the Government.

### NEW YORK ELECTIONS.

NEW YORK, Nov. 3.—Croker's Democratic candidate, Van Wyck, will have a plurality of at least sixty thousand. He polled a vote only forty thousand below Tracey and Low combined. George's vote was about 15,000.

Sir William at the Heart of the Rebellion.

### NEWS DOWN THE REBEL'S GROVES.

A Feeble Resistance Offered.

SIMLA, Nov. 3.—The insurgent tribesmen in Maidawalley were very active yesterday. They made several fierce attacks upon the British pickets. Two British officers were wounded and six Sepoys killed and thirteen wounded.

A despatch from Mastura says that Sir William Lockhart's column is encamped in Maidan Valley, hitherto an unknown district, which the Afridis had boasted no invader could penetrate. A column has visited Noirous Mo-que and grove at Bagho where the Afridis rising originated and which has been the centre of the political intrigue which has animated the outbreak of the tribesmen.

The Mo-que was left untouched and was not entered. But the trees and groves were hewn down as a mark of punishment and a sign of victory.

The enemy offered the feeblest resistance.

## THE NEWS IN SHORT METRE.

Items of Interest Rolled Down For More Easy Reading.

The Dervish commander at Metemeh, in the Sudan, has announced in the message that he lost six hundred men during the bombardment of Metemeh by the British gunboats on October 20.

Advices from Simla state that Sudda Khan and his brother, leading chiefs of the Maddaknells, have surrendered to the British. This is an important step in the settlement of the Tochi difficulty.

Governor Atkinson, of Georgia, in his message, condemns mob law, and suggests among other remedies, that the prisoners be armed and allowed to use their weapons in their own defence.

The lowest temperature ever recorded was on Dec. 20, 1871, and was experienced by Professor Gorchon. He was at Werchojast, Siberia, and the temperature was 81 degrees below zero.

The Department of Customs is receiving so many complaints about the smuggling of tobacco from the United States, especially along the international boundaries of Quebec and New Brunswick, that a vigorous effort is to be made to put a stop to it.

It is pleasing to hear that yellow fever is disappearing from Memphis. Three new cases and one death was the record for Monday. Refugees are returning by every train and the railroads report very light travel out of the city.

An important taxation appeal from the Court of Revision to the County Judge has been taken by Mr. S. Frank Wilson, which if successful, would involve the exemption of the machinery and plant of the newspapers of Toronto.

The Sultan of Morocco has won a victory over the Penanier tribe at Tadiat. The tribesmen fled to the mountains. Many prisoners were taken, and fifty five heads were spiked on the walls of Marrakech.

Commissioners appointed to fix the flour standards have decided that Ontario straight roller wheat shall not be as strong as last year and will have no Manitoba wheat in it. Formerly it was five per cent. The change is made on account of the high price of Manitoba wheat.

The Boston fund for the relief of the Windsor fire sufferers is growing, about \$500 having been collected to date. About a dozen large cases of goods have been shipped by the Yarmouth steamers. The money collected will be sent to the Windsor relief committee.

A woman arrested for keeping a dog without a license in London pleaded extreme poverty, and the magistrate allowed her fourteen days to raise the money. The newspapers spoke of the case, and within a week the clerk of the court received \$154 from British dog fanciers for her relief.

The Canadian Pacific Railway last week handled a shipment of 1,500,000 pounds of canned beef from Kansas City for the Japanese army and navy. The first shipment was made in a special train of twenty cars, over the Chicago Great Western Railroad. At St. Paul the cargo was transferred to the Canadian Pacific for Vancouver, whence it goes by steamer to Naga-aki.

The theory advanced by some of the railroad people that the embankment of the New York Central railroad, where the state express was thrown into the river on Sunday, was blown out with dynamite by train wreckers, is given little or no credence by the people of the surrounding country. The train wrecking idea is almost universally scouted, and the popular explanation of the cause of the disaster is that it was simply a "washout," of the kind so common to railroads that are built on made ground alongside of large streams of water.
