ARSON SUSPECTED

O'Leary Village Scourged By Saturday Night Fires

O'LEARY — Three fires Saturday night, suspected to be the work of an arsonist, threatened for a time to reach major proportions in the village of O'Leary.

The first blaze about twelve o'clock occurred in a small building at the rear of the Co-operative Store, used to handle and store white naphtha gasolene. The interior of the building was gutted by the time the blaze was brought under control by the O'Leary fire brigade.

Closely adjoining the hatchery are Claude MacNeill's general store, a barber shop, and the home of Robert Ellis and other stores.

Fortunately the blaze, which broke out on the second floor was also brought under control by the local firemen and the Alberton fire brigade.

A large number of chicks and 4,000 eggs were reported undamaged but the large building was badly damaged by fire, smoke and water.

It is understood that the RCMP are investigating.

Water Safety Instructors Receive Qualifying Awards

Twenty-eight Water Safety Instructors received awards last week at the concluding session of the eleven day school sponsored by the Water Safety Committee of the Provincial Red Cross.

Judge J. S. DesRoches, President of the Provincial Branch of the Red Cross Society in addressing the instructors, emphasized the importance of swimming and life saving skills and counselled the young people to keep the aims and principles of the Red Cross in their minds as they carried on their duties throughout the Province this summer.

"As representatives of the Red Cross," he said, "it will be your privilege and responsibility to interpret to those with whom you come in contact, the principles and ideals of this great Society and I am sure you will fully measure up."

AWARDS PRESENTED

Ian Rankine, Deputy Provincial Chairman, presented Red Cross Swimming-awards and Royal Life Saving Society Awards to a number of candidates. Mr. Rankine directed special words to the young men who qualified as Life Guards. "Your jobs are especially important," he said, "for on you will fall the responsibility of helping to prevent water accidents at the public beaches and also possibly effect the water rescue of some who will find themselves in serious danger."

Edward Chinery, of the Water Safety Committee presented Standard First Aid Awards to each instructor and spoke to the group on the importance of complete records and summaries of their various classes.
