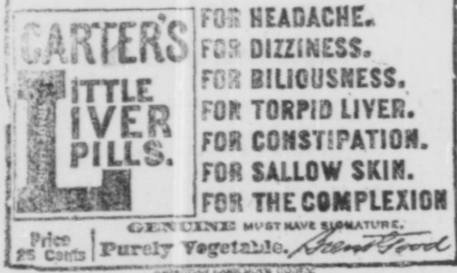

PROVINCIAL LEGISLATURE.

TUESDAY, May 22.

House met at 12.
Hon. Mr. Sinclair presented a bill in-
corporating the trustees of the Hamilton
Public Hall. Referred to Private Bills
Committee.

Hon. Mr. Gordon asked the Leader of
the Government to table copies of all
papers and correspondence with the Do-
minion Government relative to the claims
of this Province against the Federal Gov-
ernment.

Hon. Mr. Farquharson said the negotia-
tions have been mainly of a conversational
nature. If there is any correspondence
that can be used it will be tabled.

Mr. A. P. Prowse asked the Commis-
sioner of Public Works to table a state-
ment showing what contracts have been
entered into for the erection of the new
bridge at Murray Harbor South, the names
of contractors, amount of each contract,
and dates when the several contracts are
to be completed; also whether provision
has been made for conveying the public
to and fro across the river during the
time the proposed bridge is in course of
erection.

Hon. Mr. McLean promised the state-
ment asked for.

Mr. A. P. Prowse asked the Commis-
sioner of Public Works to table a state-
ment in detail of the sum of \$242,42 ex-
pended on Murray River Bridge, King's
County, in the year 1899, the nature of
the work performed, the names of all
parties to whom said money was paid and
the amount paid to each person; also the
date when the work was completed.

Hon. Mr. McLean promised to table
the statement.

Mr. A. P. Prowse asked the Commis-
sioner of Public Works to table a state-
ment in detail of the sum of \$100.40 ex-
pended on Floating Bridge, King's Co.,
in the year 1899, the nature of the work
performed, the names of all parties to
whom said money was paid and the
amount paid to each person; also the date
when the work was completed.

Hon. McLean said he would table the
information.

Mr. A. P. Prowse asked the Commis-
sioner of Public Works to table a state-
ment in detail of the sum of \$394.37 ex-
pended on Montague Bridge, King's Co.,
in the year 1899, the nature of the work
performed, the names of all parties to
whom said money was paid, and the
amount paid to each person; also date
when the work was completed.

Hon. Mr. McLean promised the state-
ment.

Hon. Mr. Sinclair tabled the Stock
Farm Report.

At the afternoon session, upon motion
of Hon. Mr. Farquharson, the bill
amending the act incorporating the
Cornwall Creamery Company was read a
second time, with Mr. Reid in the chair.
Reported, agreed to and set down for
third reading tomorrow.

A message was received from His
Honor the Lieutenant-Governor trans-
mitting the estimates for the year.

House then adjourned until ten o'clock
on Wednesday.

NOTES AND COMMENTS.

—The Manitoba Government a few
months ago went to the country reporting
a large cash surplus. It actually repre-
sented that it had \$1,054,607 in hand.
When the books were examined by the
financial experts it was found that this
was the state of affairs:

Bonded debt.....	\$4,439,850
Guaranteed debt.....	3,225,859
Bank overdrafts.....	91,522
Unpaid accounts.....	156,613

—The Star points out that all the lead-
ing Liberals are being banquetted, and re-
marks—"And there is Sir Louis Davies
—why should he be ignored? Sir Louis
should be at least tendered an "At Home"
when he reaches his native heath. His
great services on behalf of Liberalism
should not be left unrecognized, and the
provincial Liberal statesmen, headed by
