IN SOUTH AFRICA AND IN LONDON

Massing Boers at Laing's Neck

ORANGE FREE STATE AND UNITED STATES

Great Activity at Seat of British Government.

[SPECIAL TO THE EXAMINER.]

LONDON, Sept 19.—Despatches from South Africa confirm the report that the Boers are massing their artillery in positions commanding Laing's Neck.

CAPE TOWN, Sept 19.—The correspondent of the Daily Chronicle says: It is reported here that Mr. Conyngham Greene, the British diplomatic agent at Pretoria fears that an attempt will be made to dynamite the British agency.

LONDON, Sept 19.—The Cape Town correspondent of the Daily Mail says: The United States Consul in Cape Town has gone to Bloemfontein at the request of the Government of the Orange Free State, to confer regarding the crisis.

The Orange Free State executive are anxious to secure American intervention. Boer spies infest all the border towns.

Two thousand troops will be despatched to Kimberley within a week.

LONDON, September 19.—Mr. Chamberlain came to London from Birmingham yesterday afternoon and spent the evening at the Colonial Office. While there he received a despatch from Lord Salisbury, who is at Hatfield House, and sent a special messenger with a despatch to the Premier.

There has been a daily interchange of despatches between the Foreign War and Colonial offices, but no summons has yet been issued for a Cabinet Council.

Long despatches were sent last evening to the Viceroy of India and to the British High Commissioner in South Africa.

General Lord Garnet Wolseley returned to London yesterday and immediately repaired to the war office, where he remained busily employed the greater part of the day.

Stir at Port Hastings.

PORT HASTINGS, Sept. 18.—The stir and rush and air of business that is to be observed at Sydney in the North is also apparent up here at Port Hastings in the south of Cape Breton. Here are the headquarters for the construction work on the Inverness and Richmond railway by Mackenzie, Mann & Co., and the presence of 300 or 400 men in or near the village, with 1,000 on the line altogether, gives an appearance of busy life to Port Hastings that it has not possessed for many a long day.

Fast Time by Pacing Machines.

NEW BEDFORD, Mass., Sept 16.—The steam pacing machine used by Eddie McDuffie went five of the fastest consecutive miles any pacing machine has travelled on a bicycle track. The miles were ridden in 1.27 3-5, 1.28 2-5, 1.26 2-5, 1.25 3-5, and 1.26, and the total time was 7.14. The average time per mile was 1.26 4-5.

HERBERT'S STATUES

That of Her Majesty is Greatly Admired.

TORONTO, September 18.—The Evening Telegram's special cable from London says: Hebert, the eminent artist of Montreal, has made good progress with the statue of Her Majesty the Queen, which was ordered by the Dominion Government, and is to be erected at Ottawa. The statue is being cast in Paris and will be completed next March. It will be exhibited at the exposition before being sent to Canada. Bartholdi, who has examined the full sized models, complimented the artist on the statue of the Queen and also that of Alexander McKeuzie, former premier of the Dominion. The latter statue will be ready for shipment to Canada by December. Hebert's life-size bronze bust of Sir John Thompson, executed for Halifax admirers, has been completed. A replica has been ordered by Hon. J. Israel Tarte for the Parliamentary library at Ottawa. It is a striking likeness.

Wanted at Manila.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Sept. 18.—General Otis has cabled the War Department a request for additional staff officers for service in the Philippines. He asks for one additional judge advocate-general, two inspectors-general, eight quartermasters, nine commissaries of subsistence, and two engineer officers. The adjutant-general has called upon the heads of those different bureaus to designate officers for this duty, as the importance of having all the officers of the staff asked for before the next active campaign begins is recognized by the department.

Bids are 1 1/2c. lower, and business is practically dead. Cheese is pretty tame just now, and factory men are inclined to resent the indifference of buyers by holding off. It is doubtful if finest cheese on spot to-day would command more than 11c. or 11 1/2c, while finest Easterns are nominally quoted on the basis of 10 1/4 to 10 3/4c.

An American Opinion.

NEW YORK, Sept. 18.—Senator Hanna arrived here yesterday on the St. Louis, from Southampton. He said to a reporter that his health was improving somewhat while he was abroad, and that he had had a good time. "My observations of England," said Mr. Hanna, "are that it is a country with a good political system. It is fully as good as ours and England has built up a government full of stability."

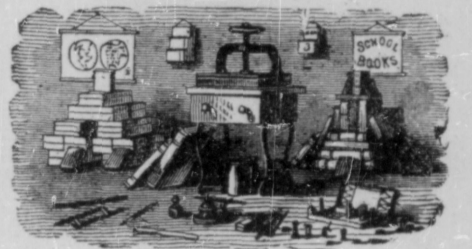
