Express Robbery.

DYNAMITE BOMBS AND REVOLVERS EMPLOYED.

Says a Delano, Cal., despatch of the 23rd: As train No. 17 left Pixley last night five men boarded it. Two went on the engine and covered the engineer and firemen with revolvers. When about two miles from the station, the train was brought to a stop, and the other three men entered the express car and ordered the messenger to open the box, covering him with revolvers. Dynamite bombs were exploded under the car, and during the excitement several passengers ran toward the front. Two of them were shot. The train was run back to Pixley, where the news was left. The passenger coaches were not molested.

Another account states that but two men were concerned in the robbery, and that while one remained on the engine, the other made his way to the express car, and by exploding bombs under the car, so frightened the messengers, that they speedily opened the doors. The amount secured by the robbers is unknown.

A ST. JOHN SHIP LOST.—News has been received of the loss of the ship Josie Troop, of St. John, with the captain and ten of the crew, off Cape Hatteras. Six of the crew escaped. No St. John men on board. The vessel is partly insured.

A GROCER SUICIDES.—Mr. J. R. Russell, a Bradford, Ont., grocer, committed suicide on Monday by shooting himself. He was a school teacher by profession. His mother died a year ago, leaving him about \$25,000, which he invested in a grocery business that is supposed to have ruined him.

SUMMERSIDE CARNIVAL.—The managers of the Crystal Rink, Summerside, have made every arrangement for a good time at their Carnival to-night. A special train with a goodly number of excursionists and Worth's Band on board, left the city at four this afternoon, and will leave Summerside at one o'clock to-morrow morning.

EMERSON ELECTED.—The local contest in Albert County, N. B., resulted in the re-election of Mr. Emmons by a majority increased from 226 to about 400. The whole force of the local government was used in his favor, and Hon. Gains Turner, the leading Conservative in the county, took an active part in favor of Emmons on local railway grounds.

Local and Other Items.

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THEY HAVE CONFESSED.—A New Haven, Conn., despatch says that two Wesleyan College freshmen have confessed to throwing bombs on Thursday night, implicating six or eight others. Hubbard, the student who lost several fingers by the explosion of a bomb in his hand, was in the plot, probably becoming excited when throwing the bomb. Physicians are confident he will recover.

THE FISHING FLEET.—During the past year, the fishing vessels of the State of Maine aggregated 16,301 tons, a considerable decrease from 1887. The fishermen of Massachusetts aggregated 47,269 tons. The greater part of the Maine vessels hail from Portland, and the majority of the Massachusetts vessels belong to Gloucester. All the fishing vessels belonging to all the other States are not equal to those which sail from Maine alone.

KILLED HIS FAMILY AND HIMSELF.—One of the most atrocious murders and suicides that has been reported for some time occurred at Casco, Wis., on the morning of the 20th. A laborer named Joseph Brogan killed his wife and two children, aged five and seven years, and then committed suicide with a dull razor. Brogan drank heavily, and had a heated quarrel with his wife. She protested because he spent all his earnings for whiskey. He was 35 years old, and had wealthy parents living in the East.

SERMON ON PERJURY.—Rev. Mr. Dobson preached a powerful sermon on Sunday night, at the Methodist Church, Fredericton, dealing at length with the question of perjury. He thought there should be no more difficulty in proving the proprietorship of certain houses than in concluding that he was a Methodist clergyman of Fredericton. Although the rev. gentleman never mentioned Scott Act or Scott Act cases, many in the congregation regarded his sermon as specially applicable to the Scott Act cases now before the police court.

SMALL POX IN ONTARIO.—Many rumors have been circulated regarding the epidemic which has made its appearance in Fingal village, six miles west of St. Thomas, Ont., and has already resulted in the death of two women, while a number of others are now suffering from the disease in that locality. Local physicians have from the first pronounced the malady chicken pox, but the results have been of such a serious nature that the medical health officer of St. Thomas was summoned. After making a careful examination of the different cases he has pronounced the disease small-pox.

A SENSATIONAL TURN.—Halifax advices say that the contest over the will of the late Alexander McLeod has taken a sensational turn. The deceased was supposed to be worth half a million. He made several wills and left the residue of his estate to Dalhousie College, cutting off many friends for whom it is alleged he had promised to provide. Legal steps were taken to upset the will, and
