All over the country wild fruits are found in varying quantity, but often in lavish plenty, while the list embraces a wide range: Plums, three varieties, currants, three; rasp, straw, goose and cranberries, blueberries, cherries in variety and several others. Some of them are so abundant as to colour the ground, and others are found in plots of several acres each, one farmer in Southern Manitoba having fenced in several acres of black currants, while blueberries are so plentiful east of Winnipeg that the Lake of the Woods district shipped last year about one hundred tons westward over the Canadian Pacific Railway.
