TORONTO has 117 miles of streets. MONTREAL has added fifty men to her city police force. NOWHERE can better Bargains be had than at R. Young's. MUSIC at the rink to-night—the ice in excellent condition. SEVERAL new cases of small-pox have appeared on the St. Croix, N. B. Two cases of drunkenness at the Stipendiary Magistrate's Court this forenoon. The mails left Cape Traverse at 10 o'clock. There was no mail to cross this way to day. There will be a meeting of Prince Edwa d Council, Royal Arcanum, to-morrow evening, at 8.30 o'clock. The steamer "Northern Light" has arrived at Georgetown. Her future movements are yet unknown. In 1881, 78,700 emigrants left Irish ports, a decrease compared with 1881. Sixty-one thousand went to America. We learn that the Canada Temperance Act appeal case is set down for argument before the Privy Council on the 28th inst. It is rumored here that a letter and newspapers received at Caribou Cove from Scotland state that the would be assassin of the Queen is a native of Nova Scotia.—Eastern Beacon. The Executive Committee of the New London Liberal-Conservative Association is requested to meet at Stanley, on Monday, the 3rd April next, at seven p. m. By order of the President. THE barque "Sidon," at New York from Cuba, reports that in latitude forty degrees longitude seventy-one degrees, she sailed through large quantities of dead codfish extending some fifty miles. THE German Emperor, in replying to an address from the Conservative party on the occasion of his eighty-sixth birthday, referred to and emphasized the statements he made in his recent manifesto on the divine right of the Crown in Prussia. THE schr. "Fruit Girl" has arrived at Burin, Nfld., after a passage of 170 days from Liverpool. She was jammed in the ice several weeks, during which the crew was reduced to almost starvation. The harbors and coast of Newfoundland is still blockaded with heavy Northern pack ice. THE Presbyterians of St. John did not respond with very great liberality to the appeals of Drs. Pollok and Burns, for the Presbyterian College endowment fund. Dr. Walker gave \$1,000; but nobody else emulated the worthy Doctor's liberality.—Halifax Herald. THE increase of the Roman Catholic Church in England has been considerable during the last few years. In 1876 the number of priests in England and Wales were 1,730, officiating in 1,061 churches and chapels. In 1882 the clergy had increased to 2,331, and the places of worship 1,476. BIG CATCH.—The schooner "Grace L. Fears," which arrived at Gloucester, from Grand Banks, on the 23rd inst., weighed off 68,825 pounds of halibut, 3,000 pounds of cod fish, which sold for \$6,016 50, the crew sharing \$206 30 each on a five weeks trip. This is the best stock ever made on a halibut trip. A JOB IN THE SANDWICH ISLANDS.—Sixteen carpenters from Halifax have left for Honolulu, S. I., to build a marine railway in the harbor there. They are in charge of Mr. Crandall, C. E. Wages, \$50 per month, to count from date of departure until arrival home; fares paid there and back; \$1 per day allowed for board on the journey. A SALE of Pure iron horses took place at Baltimore, Md., on the 22nd inst. The highest price for a stallion was \$1,775, and for a mare \$1,350. Home bred colts brought \$750. The sale was attended by representatives of New York, Connecticut, Texas, Colorado, Tennessee, Illinois, Virginia and other States, and some of the horses were taken by purchasers from the most remote points. THE association styling itself the International Revolutionary League, consisting of foreign refugees in London, and professing to include Americans, held a meeting last evening. The commutation of the sentences of the nihilists was referred to as merely the straw on a volcano. A resolution was adopted denouncing McLean's attempt upon the life of the Queen.

A GRACIOUS DONATION.—A most estimable young lady belonging to Catenary Church, who takes great interest in the work of rebuilding the new church edifice, has presented Rev. D. D. Currie, pastor, with a memorial window for the church, to be dedicated to his memory. This is a very delightful donation, and it will be eminently proper for any other who desiring to follow her example. Already several windows have been donated, and others will probably be taken soon.—St. John News. PARTICULARS of the catastrophe on the Northern Pacific Railroad, near Deadwood, D. T., on the 23rd, show that eight persons were killed outright, and a number seriously but, it is thought, not fatally wounded. The accident arose from one of the wheels of a flat car breaking, causing two sleeping cars, in which were 30 men, to jump the track and fall over the bridge to the river beneath. The cars took fire, and all the victims were horribly burned. The coroner's jury have found that the wreck was accidental.

RICHMOND, Va., March 26. A disastrous conflagration occurred here to-day, destroying many large tobacco warehouses, tenement houses and other property. The total loss is estimated at between \$50,000 and \$60,000. HAVRE, March 26. A life boat while proceeding to the rescue of the crew of a ship during a gale to-day capsized, and the crew numbering 19 persons were drowned. ROME, March 26. The Pope declares that he will not receive the Emperor Francis Joseph at the Vatican, if the Emperor visits King Humbert at Rome. BOSTON, March 26. The obsequies of the late Henry Wadsworth Longfellow, were held at Cambridge to-day. Private services were held at his residence at 2.30, being attended only by the relatives and most intimate friends. The remains were taken to Mount Auburn Cemetery for interment. LONDON, March 26. The race for the Liverpool Spring Cup, to-day, was won by Ellesmere's "Wallenstein," Machells "Valour" taking second place, and "Forester's "Dreamland" a bad third. The winner is an American bred horse, having been purchased from P. Lorrillard. He won without difficulty, finishing four lengths ahead of "Valour."
