**A CONTRAST.**

SIR.—As was noted in a late issue of THE EXAMINER, on the eve of his departure for South Africa Mr. Frederick McRae received the handsome present of \$15 from the officers and men of his battalion. In this tribute of respect to their parting comrade, those gentlemen have given us another proof of the reality of that bond of union which exists between those enrolled to fight under the same banner.

In striking contrast with this "send off" to Mr. McRae by his brother volunteers was the one given him by his brothers of the I O G T. forget it all,

The Liberal majority in the last election was 1400. Mr. Campbell gets a registration worth \$3,000 a year. Mr. Straton's majority in West Peterborough last election was 999. It is not a great indication of strength when Cabinet Ministers are selected from party hives.

**ABANDONED ON AN ISLAND.**—A St. John's, Nfld., despatch of the 31st says: The steamer Labrador, which has just arrived here from a trip along the Labrador coast, reports that a fishing crew of 30 people are on a desolate island off the northern section of the coast, where they have been virtually abandoned for some time, owing to the fact that the instructions for a vessel to bring them miscarried. A special steamer must be sent promptly to their assistance, or they will perish from cold and hunger during the coming winter.

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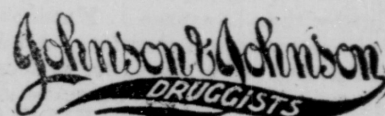

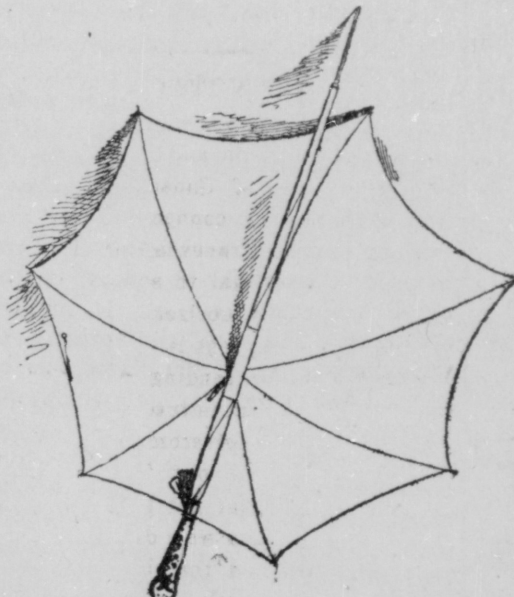
