Opening lead—ten of diamonds. Proper technique in handling the spade suit enabled South to bring home a slam in a hand where a misstep would have proved fatal. South started with a sure club loser, two hearts to take care of, and possible though remote trump loser. He won the diamond lead in his own hand and immediately played a club toward dummy's K-Q. There were two good reasons to tackle clubs first. West, if he has the ace of clubs, may make the error of not taking it, in which case the club loser is eliminated. Secondly, even if West has the club ace and takes it, the problem of how to deal with the losing hearts is automatically solved because the K-Q of clubs provide discards for South's hearts. West rose to the occasion, however, took the ace of clubs and returned a diamond, won in dummy. The situation by now had resolved itself to the simple question of whether or not there would be a trump loser. There was no danger of losing a trump unless one defender had four spades. If West had them, it would be impossible to avoid the loss of a trump. But if East had the missing four trumps, they could be trapped by proper play. Accordingly, South avoided the error of leading a low trump to his king, which would have defeated him. He played the ace of spades first, West showing out. A low trump was then played. Dummy was next entered with the king of hearts, the K-Q of clubs were cashed, South discarding the ten, and a trump led which picked up East's J-8 of spades to score the slam. South's management of the note. The philosophy behind the ace of spades play is that there is no control over West's having the four spades; that what can't be cured must be endured. East, though, can be brought to terms.

**Plan Restricted Death Penalty in Great Britain**  
 LONDON (Reuters)—The government published plans Thursday to restrict the death penalty in Britain to five kinds of murder. These are: murder committed in the course of theft; in resisting, avoiding or escaping from arrest; murder of policemen or prison officers; murders by shooting or causing explosions; and repeated murder. The proposals will be debated by the House of Commons which already this year, against government advice, voted for abolition of the death penalty. The proposals are contained in a parliamentary bill which is bound to cause bitter controversy among politicians who contend the government should accept the expressed will of the House of Commons. The bill explains that the classes of murder for which hanging will be retained are aimed at preventing murders by professional criminals, murder of the agents of law and order, and murder by means which are apt to be indiscriminate in their effect and peculiarly dangerous to the general public.

Mistress Moon was high in the sky and there on the ledge it was almost as light as by day. Over in the Green Forest were many black shadows and among them

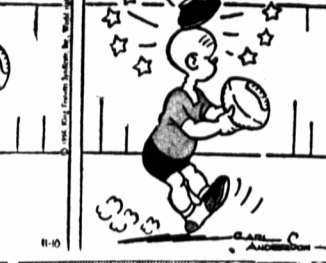
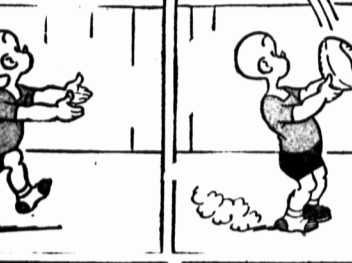
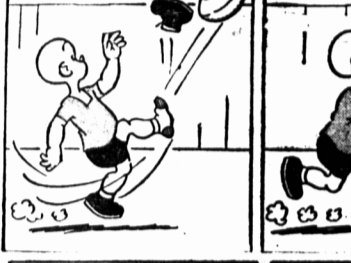
