A sewing committee of four was named to finalize plans for sewing classes in the school. The meeting was a closed by singing "The Queen" which was served by the hostess.

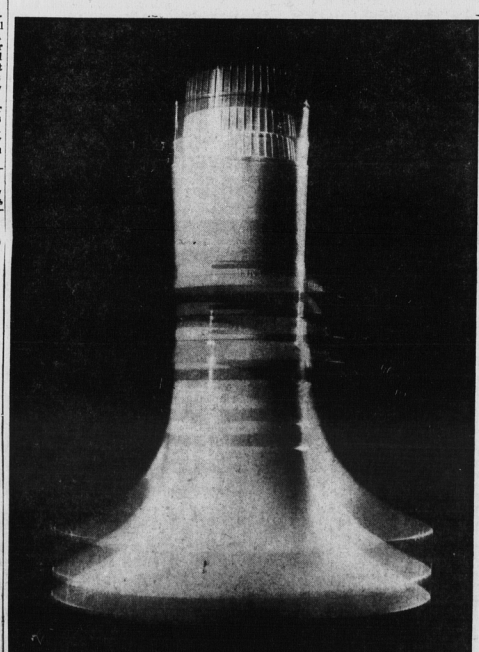

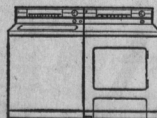

ENVOY RESIGNS
LONDON (Reuters) — Ngo Dinh Luven, South Viet Nam's ambassador here, announced his resignation Saturday night, denouncing the new regime in Saigon for what he called the murders of his older brothers, overthrown president Ngo Dinh Diem and Ngo Dinh Nhu. He said he decided to relinquish his position as ambassador in London and minister in Belgium, Holland and Austria.
