

Lions Swamp Rollaway Aces

DOWN THE BACK STRETCH

New York tabloids are featuring our native son, Joe O'Brien, as the next big thing. An excerpt from the New York Mirror, written by Sidney Fields, has this to say: "Joseph Cyril O'Brien, one of the canniest drivers and trainers in the harness racing game, stands five feet six inches, weighs 130 pounds, drove his first race at 14, is now 40, and has white hair sprinkled with grey."

"And the hair is not from those that don't," says Joe. He's driven in more than 5,000 races. His middle name (Cyril) means 'lordly,' which is hardly applicable. He's gentle, shy, always talks so softly it sounds like a whisper.

"Since he became chief driver and trainer for the S. A. Camp Farms, Shafter, California, in 1952, his horses have earned some \$2,000,000. Joe is the only man who has won the triple crown in trotting: The Hambletonian, the Vonkers Trot, and the Kentucky Futurity. The three purses came to over \$300,000. The Brown Jug is the one I tried five times and missed," says Joe. "I'll keep trying."

"Joe now drives almost all the horses he trains; the rest are driven by his two assistants — Tom Carter, from Indiana, and Gene Mattucci, from Brooklyn. Joe did own four horses of his own, but sold three because his wife, Betty, says 'owning horses is like well-to-do people.' The only one he keeps is out of Scott Frost, which won the Hambletonian in 1955 and is appropriately named Golden Promise.

"He and Betty have a home in San Joaquin Valley, California, and every year for 10 years they have been promising themselves a trip somewhere. But in the off-racing season, Joe breaks colts and acts as manager of the Camp breeding ranch. He has no hobbies, no interests, only horses. "And where do they stay while he's racing in out of Scott Frost, which won the Hambletonian in 1955 and is appropriately named Golden Promise."

MILWAUKEE (AP) — Milwaukee's Carl Willey bested the Cardinals' Bob Mabe in a rookies pitching duel Tuesday night. Del Crandall's eighth-inning sacrifice fly sent over the deciding run as the Braves defeated St. Louis 2-1.

The triumph, in the second meeting of a four-game series, enabled the Braves to climb within a half game of the National League leaders San Francisco Giants, rained out at Philadelphia.

Hank Aaron led the Braves at the plate with four singles in four trips and had a hand in each scoring burst. The Milwaukee right fielder pushed his average to .305.

CLEVELAND (AP) — Cleveland's new southpaw, Hal Woodeshick, won his second complete game Tuesday night, stopping Washington 5-3 after the tribe's Cal McLish was beaten 4-2 by a pair of 12th-inning home runs in the opener of the two-night twin bill.

Consecutive homers by Norm Zauchin and Ken Aspromonte, spoiled the 32-year-old McLish's bid to run his winning string to six straight.

Two Americans Share Lead In Canadian Golf Tourney

TORONTO (CP) — Marty Stanovich, 240-pounder from Chicago, and veteran Jack Penrose of Miami Beach, Fla., shared medalist honors Tuesday in the qualifying round for the Canadian amateur golf championship.

Each fired 68, three under the Scarborough course par, to put with 68s of Monday.

At 137 they were five strokes under par for the 36-hole qualifying distance and 14 strokes better than a group of nine who went into sudden-death playoff for the last qualifying spot. They finished at 151.

Two of the nine were shuffled out — John Miller of Minneapolis and Ernie Nerlich of Toronto. Each had a six at the 584-yard par-five first hole.

Last qualifying figure preparatory to match play starting today with 64 players became 151 when 57 golfers finished the 36-hole test with 150 or better and nine were in the 151 bracket.

There were 14 who bettered par in Tuesday's windup round. For the two days of play only six were under the 36-hole par of 142.

Nick Westlock of Windsor, Ont., and Gary Cowan of Kitchener were the only Canadians who could match Tuesday's 68 by the two top Americans. Each had 71 Monday.

With them at 139 was Bob Brue of Milwaukee, who had rounds of 69-70.

Starting the first round at match play today will be 26 Americans, of 57 who entered, and 38 Canadians. The original entry list for the big field in qualifying play was 186, but because of scratches and withdrawals 171 completed Monday's first round. There were a few more withdrawals Tuesday.

Penrose and Westlock played the steadiest golf of the day's low scores. Neither strayed from par. Penrose sank birdie putts of two, 10 and 14 feet to cut the three strokes off Scarborough's par 71. Westlock dropped a six-footer at the seventh, another at the 16th and ran down a 15-footer at the home hole.

Stanovich, who is 43 and bends low over his club despite his girth, shot five birdies on the front nine and two more coming home but slipped over par at the short second and the par-four 455-yard 12th.

B.C. Oarsmen Bring First Gold Medal To Canada

CARDIFF (CP) — As expected, the husky contingent of oarsmen from the University of British Columbia Tuesday brought Canada her first gold medal of the current British Empire Games.

But top honors at the picturesque, mountain-dominated north Wales town of Lake Padarn went to England, which captured three of the six top prizes available to the Commonwealth oarsmen, forcing two fancies Canadian crews to settle for silver.

In the day's crowded track and field program at Cardiff Arms Park, two hurdlers broke a world record and nearly every event on the card brought a Games mark tumbling.

Canadians had to settle for a pair of six-place finishes while the rumpaging Australians cleaned up at the track with three gold medals, two silver and one bronze.

But the unheralded Canadian fencer team came up with a silver medal in the team epee event, preceding undefeated to the final round before bowing to England, which has yet to concede a gold medal to any rival swordsmen.

NO SWIM FINALS
There were no finals on Tuesday night's swimming program but the records toppled just the same, highlighted by a backstroke leg of 1:12.3 in the women's 440-yard medley relay by England's Margaret Edwards, that shaved one-tenth of a second off her own world record over 100 yards.

Automatic Games records were set in the relay, increased from 330 yards with the addition of a butterfly leg, and in the men's and women's butterfly events, which were new on the games program.

The Canadian team of Sara Barber, Brantford, Ont.; Irene Service, Vancouver; Margaret Iwasaki, Vancouver, and Gladys Priestley, Verdun, Que., qualified for the final and Miss Iwasaki also qualified in the women's butterfly.

But the pace in the men's 440 freestyle, in which two Australians and a Scot bettered the Games record, was too fast for Bill Slater of Vancouver and Ken Williams of Toronto. Susan Sangster of West Vancouver and Miss Priestley fared no better in the women's 440.

Montreal's Cameron Grout was the only other successful Canadian swimmer, gaining a qualifying berth in the men's 220-yard butterfly.

Irene MacDonald of Hamilton was lying fourth at the halfway point in the women's high diving competition, which ends Friday.

TRACK HEROES
Individual heroes of the track events were a New Zealand schoolteacher with a withered arm and a South African detective who survived a broken neck and came back to break world records.

Murray Halberg, a 24-year-old teacher whose left arm and shoulder were permanently damaged by a rigger injury eight years ago, ran a field studded with big names into the track to win the three miles in 13 minutes, 15 seconds, a games record.
