Provision Made For Goodwill Scholarship

The establishment of a scholar-
ship at Prince of Wales College to
be known as the Victor Lyall Good-
will Scholarship was decided upon
at a meeting of the Executive
Council this week. The award has
been made possible by a bequest of
\$3,000 from the late Mrs. Florence
M. Goodwill, Charlottetown, sup-
plemented by the Government
to provide for a scholarship of the
annual value of \$200.
