SERVICE OF SONG.—At the Gospel meeting in the Y. M. C. A. Hall to-morrow afternoon, at 4 o'clock, there will be a service of sacred song by a full choir, led by Mr. Hawley. All are invited.

QUITE PROPER.—We understand that Mr. Newbery will not perform work on Queen Square this year unless the Local Government and City Council contribute their usual donation to the fund.

TWO CURIOSITIES.—The Sun states that two curiosities were shown in the St. John County market yesterday; viz.: a shad weighing 9 lbs. and a lobster 6 1/2 lbs. They were the largest ever seen in that market.

CATTLE SHIPMENT.—Mr. Thompson, of Montague, shipped to-day, on the ship, Lever, Cunningham, master, about sixty head of very fine cattle for the Newfoundland market. The cattle are of prime quality and will probably sell well.

ISLAND HORSES.—Mr. W. F. Giddien, of Woodstock, N. B., was among the passengers in the western train this morning, taking with him several splendid horses. He will take up several more in Summerside, and cross over to Point du Chene on Monday.

GOOD SHOOTING.—In the Martini-Heuri competition for the Inter-provincial Match, to be held at St. John, N. B., in June next, Capt. John A. Longworth made 97 points out of a possible 105. The score was made up as follows: 200 yard range, 30 points; 500 yards, 33 points; 600 yards, 34 points. This is said to be the best score ever made on Kensington Range.

PERCUSSION BLACKMAIL.—In some respects New York is ahead of Charlottetown—even in advance of Souris. For instance a New York man who owns one or two vacant lots adjoining improved property will threaten to build a cheap tenement house unless the other property owners pay him several hundred dollars to "restrict" it. There are men who make a regular business of doing this, and who make money by it.

TEN MINERS KILLED.—At Kaska William colliery, near Middleport, Pa., on Thursday evening last a cage containing ten miners ascending a shaft had reached a height of about 16 feet from the bottom when an empty car was pushed over the top of the shaft by two Hungarian laborers. The car struck the ascending cage with awful momentum, shattering to splinters and instantly killing every occupant. The shaft is 500 feet deep.

A FEMALE FRIEND.—The body of Sydney Bolton, aged 11, who died at Deptford, Eng., in February last, has been exhumed, and evidence of arsenical poisoning found in the remains. The boy had boarded with Mrs. Winter, a relative, who upon his death obtained £20 insurance by forging the name of the boy's mother to the insurance receipt. Since 1885 Mrs. Winter insured 27 relatives, and five died. It is believed that she poisoned the five and intended to poison others. Mrs. Winter, at latest accounts, had not been arrested, because of illness.

CHANGEABLE WEATHER.—The weather yesterday was fine and warm, the thermometer registering 74 degrees. Between five and six o'clock in the afternoon, however, a squall struck in, during the prevalence of which the dust was so dense that at times it was difficult to see the buildings on the opposite side of the street. About seven o'clock rain began to fall, accompanied by thunder and lightning between eight and nine o'clock and early this morning. About twenty minutes past six this morning there was a slight snow flurry, and another shortly before eight. Throughout to-day the weather was quite cool, and overcoats were comfortable.

One Traveller Doesn't Return.

Says the St. John Sun: J. T. McMurray, a commercial traveller said to belong to Windsor, N. S., visited St. John a few days ago and now several persons regret his sudden departure. McMurray while here represented himself as a traveller for M. F. Eager, wholesale druggist, of Halifax, and he succeeded in collecting considerable money in drafts and in other ways. On Monday last a firm of soap manufacturers received a telegram from Mr. Eager, stating that their draft had been refused, and next day they got a letter which explained that McMurray had represented himself as travelling for another house and had secured permission to sell for Eager on commission, with the distinct understanding that he was not to collect any bills or make any drafts, as they would be refused. The latter further stated that the St. John draft was the fifth one that had been refused. Enquiry was made at the hotel where McMurray had been stopping and it was learned that he had left Monday morning with his baggage checked to Boston. None of the drafts made in this city were for large amounts. McMurray is believed to be a resident of Windsor, N. S.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER. Nova Scotia News.

HALIFAX, N. S., May 10. Surrogate Payzant gave judgment to-day sustaining the will of the late Alexander McLeod, by which the residue of his estate, some \$40,000, was left to Dalhousie College.

Sergeant Blackburne, a deserter from the West Riding Regiment, has been captured. Sir John Thompson has returned from Ottawa.

The warship Emerald arrived from Bermuda to-day. Sandy McGuire struck a rich pocket in the New Albion Mines, and brought to the city to-night a box of quartz of extraordinary richness, valued at \$3,000 to \$4,000. Competent judges say it is the richest specimen ever seen in this part of the world. The mine is owned by Charles Annand, proprietor of the Halifax Chronicle.

Another Victim.

KINGSTON, Ont., May 10. This morning, while a freight train was proceeding to the city on the Kingston and Pembroke Railway, a dark object was encountered near Madawaska, and the engine went over it before the train was stopped. Investigation showed that Harvey Meek, of the Iron Mine Co. at Wilbur, had been cut in two and his hands also severed. He had fallen asleep on the track. Liquor caused his death.

Followed the Band.

TORONTO, May 10. Charles A. Shaw, late manager of the Toronto opera house, has gone to New York. He has left debts behind him to the extent of \$13,000, and ex-Alderman Pells has sworn out a capias for several thousand dollars due as rent for the Toronto opera house. Shaw's immediate return is not expected.

MONTREAL, May 10. Argument in the exception to the form filed by the defendants in the Jesuit-Mail case did not take place yesterday, as was expected, on account of the absence of Hon. Mr. Laflamme; the argument will take place to-morrow.

Mercier Discouraged.

QUEBEC, May 10. Premier Mercier leaves for Montreal and St. Hyacinthe to-day. He is greatly discouraged over the recent split amongst the Montreal Liberals, and in order to bring the recalcitrants within the traces threatens to resign.

Od Their Way Home.

QUEBEC, May 10. A number of English sailors who were in the Samoan hurricane, when so many vessels were wrecked, arrived here yesterday from British Columbia, and took the outward bound mail steamer for home.

Great Eastern Plates.

MONTREAL, May 10. An immense quantity of plates of the Great Eastern, recently broken up, have been received in Montreal for the Iron Factory and Rolling Mills.

Work Commenced.

KINGSTON, Ont., May 10. Work on the Kingston dry dock was commenced yesterday morning, and it is expected to take two years to complete it.
