

Yankee Blaze Cops Two In Action Packed Racing

Yankee Blaze captured both leads of the featured Invitational Pace at the Charlotte Driving Park on Saturday night winning the sixth dash in 2:06.4 and the tenth dash in 2:07. Emmett Bernard drove the son of Yankee Hanover dam Nogara Hanover to the two wins as both times he took the lead at the quarter pole and won going away. Lee's Way C with S. D. Brad driving finished second both times out, and Eloise Wick with Walter Craig driving finished third both trips.

The exciting pacer Hurrah finished 4-5 as both times the rugged son of Rodney was too far back to make use of his blinding stretch speed. The roan pacing mare Rose Robin finished 4-4.

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Larry Jaster pitched a three-hitter in a duel with Don Drysdale Saturday as St. Louis Cardinals blanked Los Angeles Dodgers 2-0.

Dal Maxwell broke a scoreless tie with a fifth-inning single and Lou Brock cracked a bases-empty homer in the ninth as Cardinals handed Drysdale his 11th loss in 16 decisions. The Dodger right-hander, who has lost seven of his last eight, gave up six hits.

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — Bill White and Rich Allen hit home runs and drove in two runs each as Philadelphia Phillies whipped Chicago Cubs 6-2 Sunday for their sixth straight victory.

White smacked a double and two run homer, scored two runs and stole a base while Allen drilled a run-scoring double and bases-empty homer.

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — Atlanta pitcher Tony Cloninger became the first National League player to hit two grand slam homers in one game Sunday as Braves crushed San Francisco Giants 17-3.

America's Billie J. King Captures Wimbledon Title

WIMBLEDON, England (AP) — Mrs. Billie Jean King, a slimmer and more subdued version of the happy-go-lucky little Miss Moffitt of previous years—Saturday brought the Wimbledon women's title back to the United States after four years with Maria Bueno of Brazil.

The standard of tennis throughout the final never matched the perfect weather, and not until the last few games of the third set did Mrs. King manage to impose complete authority over her opponent.

She did it by solving the problem of how to handle Miss Rousey's high-kicking second serve. From then on she dropped only four more points to rattle off the last three games for the match.

But before that, it was a procession of service errors, poorly timed drives, netted volleys and lost opportunities by both girls in 65 minutes of nervous tennis. It was Miss Bueno's fifth final appearance — she won three times in 1959, 1960 and 1964.

PLAYED HARD
Mrs. King was playing in her second final, having lost to Margaret Smith three years ago. Both played, however, as if it was their first sight ever of the famed centre court.

Not even near the end, when Maria started to wilt despondently and Billie Jean seemed to grow several inches taller as she sensed victory, did the match approach the excitement

and tennis seen in the men's final Friday. Sixteen Manuel Santana, 26, of Spain and Dennis Ralston, 26, of Bakersfield, Calif. Santana won 6-4, 11-9, 6-4.

An indication of how little command the once-imperious Miss Bueno had on the match came in the eighth game of the second set, when Mrs. King presented her with no less than three double faults yet still managed to win that made no difference to the result, as the Brazilian held service the next game for the set.
