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Canal Zone Across Panamas Long-Time Sore Spot

PANAMA CITY (AP) — The U.S. Canal Zone has blasted the tiny nation of Panama for nearly 60 years—almost from the moment of its birth.

And it has ranked Panamanians ever since. On the map of Panama it is a narrow strip across the waist of the country, cutting the land in two. Alongside the broad Fourth of July Avenue on the edge of this city is a tall, steel wire fence...

On the other side of the fence is the crowded, noisy slum-district downtown district of the Panamanian capital.

The stripe on the map and the steel fence mark the slice of territory miles wide and nearly 50 miles long known as the Canal Zone.

Inside the zone is the gigantic waterway built by the United States to link the major oceans of the world.

WHY A SORE SPOT? Why has it been the cause of vexatious relations between the United States and Panama?

Interviews with scores of Panamanians—from peasant to president—reveal several key sources of humiliation, frustration and irritation. In essence they are: 1. U.S. sovereignty over the zone.

2. The U.S. holds this sovereignty "in perpetuity." It cannot be changed nor ever will the U.S. be willing to...

3. The privileges and salaries of U.S. employees in the zone and some of their isolation and aloofness.

4. The U.S. annual payment for the zone—far too low, according to Panamanians.

5. The U.S. disregard for lengthy coastlines on two oceans, in a sense, landlocked. The two major bays—Panama Bay and the Pacific and Colon on the Caribbean—do not have their own ports; the docks are in the U.S. Canal Zone.

TRYING TO PLEASE Recently, the United States has been moving to ease the anti-U.S. pressures.

Some Panamanians see this as a welcome, new overture step. For others, the move is too few and too late.

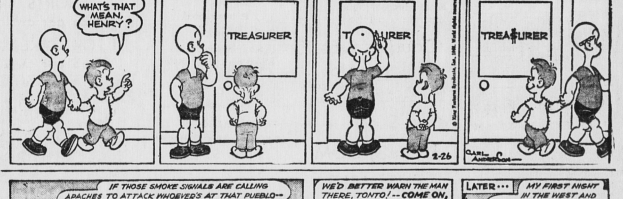
The bidding: North 2NT, South West 1NT, Double Reddie 2NT, Pass 2NT

CRIME JUMP FORECAST

LONDON (Reuters)—The Crime Review has forecast 1963 will be a grim year for crime in Britain, where the criminal class has more than half a chance and probably the best chance at any time in our history.

Referring to an 8.8 per cent rise in crime in central London year, an article in the magazine said: "Less than a quarter of the crimes in London are detected. In most parts of the country the proportion of detected crimes is less than half."
