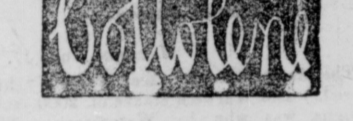

LAPAGE'S OLD STAND.

Trade With Britain.

(Montreal Gazette.)

We make the broad assertion that under the operation of the National Policy tariff trade between Canada and Great Britain has been promoted, and we challenge contradiction of the statement. It is altogether beside the question to say that under a system of free imports and direct taxation a larger quantity of British goods would be consumed in Canada, because this is a merely speculative dictum, incapable of satisfactory demonstration, and which must ignore wholly the consequence to the domestic trade of Canada of the substitution of foreign for home manufactured goods. The only true comparison possible is between the import trade of the Dominion to-day that under the revenue tariff of 1878, and the figures conclusively show that, as respects those classes of goods not produced in Canada, we are purchasing more largely from the mother country than ever before. It may be said, however, that an importation of \$53,137,572 from the United States last year, as against an importation of \$41,348,435 from Britain does not bear out this declaration. Let us analyse the figures. Here is a statement of goods brought into Canada in 1892, which, with two or three exceptions, are admitted free of duty:

Nearly one third of the imports from Great Britain thus detailed consists of wool, not of English growth, but entered in the Customs returns as imported from that country. Now, we submit that no tariff, however framed, can affect the source of supply of the above articles which go to make up the aggregate of Canada's import trade. A high duty on any of them would simply impose new taxation upon the people of this country, without in any degree promoting commercial relations with the mother land. Then there is embraced in the returns a considerable quantity of agricultural produce, subject to duty, purchased abroad by Canadians, the list being as follows for 1892:

Here, again, we have a list of articles the source of supply of which cannot be affected as between Britain and the States by any tariff arrangement, since the former country is not an exporter of agricultural products. Deducting, therefore, these items of natural production with which England cannot furnish us, however anxious we may be to buy from her, the relative value of imports into Canada stands thus for the last fiscal year:

That is to say, under the operation of the present tariff, and dealing with those classes of goods susceptible of production in both countries, Canada buys from Britain more than 50 per cent. in excess of her purchases from the United States. Take, as an illustration, manufactures of wool. Last year we imported woolen goods to the value of \$9,401,480 from Great Britain, and to the value of only \$144,072 from the United States. The National Policy tariff has helped this trade. Since 1878 a large decline in the price of woolen goods has occurred, the home manufacturing industry has been greatly developed and extended, yet in 1878 we bought woolen goods to the value of \$7,974,917 from England, while from the United States we purchased to the amount of \$405,687. Under the present tariff, home production has been stimulated, imports from Britain are \$1,500,000 larger, in spite of the fall in prices, while imports from the States have declined two-thirds. In view of all these facts, it is well to enquire into the figures before making the unseemly assertion that the tariff has hurt trade with Great Britain, or that it discriminates against that country in favor of a foreign nation.

The English racing yachts Valkyrie, Britannia and Iverna collided a few days ago during one of the big races. The two latter were obliged to withdraw from the race; the Valkyrie escaped with little or no damage.

The Harvard and Yale crews are already quartered on the Thames, Conn. Both the freshman and varsity crews are a hard practice. It is a hard matter to pick a winner this time. Harvard lately surprised Bob Cook, Yale's old coach, by going a phenomenal two miles. The races will be held during the last week in June.
