Heads Of High Minors Serve Notice On Continental League

NEW YORK (AP) - Heads of the high minors served notice Wednesday on Branch Rickey and his embryonic Continental League to be ready to pay damages amounting to approximately \$8,000,000 for invasion of their territories.

Ed Doherty, president of the American Association, which may lose six of its ten franchises to the newly organized would-be major circuit, said he already has demanded a million dollars indemnity for each of the cities taken.

Houston, Denver and the twincities of Minneapolis-St. Paul, all members of the A.A., are among the five founders of the Continental League. The new league also is eyeing the Dallas - Fort Worth area. Toronto of the International League and New York also are definitely in the new loop. "If they (Continental League) think they can operate - and I wish them luck," said Doherty, "let them pay for the privilege. I've got to protect the people who have investments in my league. I don't think anybody has the right to demand territory without paying for the privilege of using it. "If they take those six cities away from us, the American Association is dead. I'd have only four clubs for a nucleus of another league." Frank Shaughnessy, president of the International League, said he would ask for approximately a million dollars for Toronto and the possible loss of another of his cities, either Montreal or Buffalo. "They claim they've got millions," said the silvery-haired veteran of more than 50 years in baseball. "Well, they'd better get ready to spend some of it." Surprisingly, top officials feel that another major league would help, rather than hurt, the minor league structure.

S' side Minors Cop Series Openers

Summerside Minor League teams won both playoff contests from the Charlottetown Abbies yesterday morning at Memorial Field. The Little Leaguers from the Western Capital shut out the Little League Abbies 5-0, while their older counter-parts blasted the Bantam Abbies 9-4. Paul MacWilliams, pitching for the visiting Little League club turned in a fine game, sending nine down via the strike-out route, walking three and giving up two hits. Billy Weatherby started for the Abbies in this contest but was relieved by Fred MacDonald in the third. Both Abbie hurlers were tagged for a total of six

hits, while striking out eight and walking four. B. Dickey of Summerside led all batters at the plate with a double and two singles. P. Mullen and P. MacWilliams had doubles for the visitors. Billy Weatherby got both hits for the Abbies. Summerside took a 2-0 lead in the third and added three more insurance markers in the final frame. The losers threatened on a number of occasions but just couldn't seem to get to MacWilliams. Wayne Matheson scattered ten hits in halting the Abbies in the Bantam fixture. His steady control and smare fielding on the part of his team kept him in full control throughout. The Abbies used three pitchers in an effort to halt the boys from Prince County. Ken Squarebriggs started but was relieved by Jimmyuffy, who in turn was replaced by Keith Doyle. Summerside collected but six hits from the local boys, however, they issued a total of thirteen walks. P. Kelly and H. Muttart led the Summerside attack with 6-0 hits each. Leslie Barnes, Peter MacIntyre and Jim Duffy had two hits each for the Abbies. Toronto Scribes Sing Praises Of Ronnie Knox

TORONTO (CP) - Toronto football writers sang the praises Wednesday of quarterback Ronnie Knox after the 21-20 victory by Toronto Argonauts over Ottawa Rough Riders at Ottawa Tuesday night. Knox, the "Golden Boy" from UCLA who triggered a late season Argo comeback drive last year, tossed three touchdown passes to fire the Argos to victory in the opener of their Big Four Football Union schedule. Coach Hamp Pool was enthusiastic about the Knox performance. After the game he told the writers: "I was sold on this guy before but he proved tonight he's the greatest. No one playing football can do what Ronnie does." Telegram sports editor Hal Walker says Knox handled "one of the greatest jobs of field generalship a coach could ask for." Walker says the injury to Wend Peter O'Garro forced Knox completely to change his pass offense in the middle of the game. The fact that he did it so effectively was the "test" of a truly great quarterback.

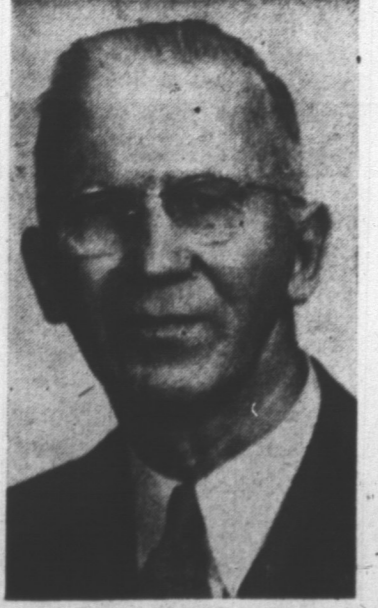
