Premier Reports Business Calls

Premier W.R. Shaw is combining business with pleasure on his six-week holiday tour of the British Isles.

In a letter to his office here, Mr. Shaw stated that he and Mrs. Shaw spent the first nine days in London and then motored to Devon and Cornwall for a few days before proceeding to Edinburgh.

In London Mr. Shaw reported that he made several business contacts through the Atlantic Provinces House and also enjoyed a round of entertainment from business houses and private citizens.

Mr. and Mrs. Shaw will remain in Scotland until Sept. 10 when they will proceed to Dublin for the opening ceremonies of the gathering of Associated Country Women of the World.

Dropout Rates Alarm Leader

MONCTON (CP)—Opposition Leader C.B. Sherwood of New Brunswick told the provincial labor federation Monday that society should begin a

back-to-school program for the youth of the province.

Mr. Sherwood was addressing the opening session of the New Brunswick Labor Federation's Ninth Constitutional Convention here.

"It is alarming to see the vast number of names of youth that appear on the list of the seasonally employed," he said, "we cannot emphasize too much the importance of people in the province's economy. But there cannot be equality while many of them have no trade or skill or cannot work to earn a decent living."

Labor Minister K.J. Webber told the meeting that New Brunswick is in the midst of an industrial, social and economic expansion which has not been witnessed in this depth and magnitude in any previous period but he expressed concern with the growing number of applications for work permits for persons under 16.

"I am not so much concerned that the children are employed but rather that they would be better employed in pursuing their training and schooling," he said. "Therefore I urge the federation to take a strong stand on this matter."

ACCIDENT DAMAGES

Four persons admitted to hospital and over \$3,000 damages were the results of a number of weekend accidents. From Thursday August 19th to Sunday the 22, a rash of two-car collisions were investigated by city police. August 19, Kirkwood Drive, \$150; August 21, Water St. and Haviland St. \$200; August 21, Euston St. at Orlebar, \$528; August 22, 177 Elm Ave., \$400.

Two women received minor injuries August 23 when vehicles in which they were passengers collided on Cumberland Street near the corner of Kent Street. Damage to the cars was estimated at \$900.

Another accident on the same day near Queens County Jail on Longworth Ave. resulted in slight damage to the two cars involved while an approximate \$400 was sustained at the corner of Prince and Sydney streets when another two-car collision took place.

One person was hospitalized with cuts to the forehead, and knee from a two-car collision at the intersection of Churchill Ave. and Greenfield Ave., Aug. 24.

A two-car collision on the Kensington Road near the

lower Kent Street crossing August 27 saw \$1,000 damage received by the cars involved.

Saturday, August 28, saw a car hit a guy wire on Eden Street and fell a utility pole. Slight damage to the vehicle resulted.

A car struck a fence on North River Road near the corner of Kirkwood Ave. the following day and damage was estimated at \$100.

Athena Ratepayers Present Protest At Cabinet Meeting

After voicing strong objections to the provincial cabinet yesterday to the opening of the proposed liquor store near Athena High School, Edwin Lewis, Free-town, spokesman for a group of some 30 citizens from the affected areas, reported that no member of the Cabinet had spoken.

"When we finished the Acting Premier (Hon. M. A. Farmer) simply said 'thank you,'" reported Mr. Lewis. "The large group told the cabinet they 'protest the dictatorial and undemocratic attitude displayed by the government,' regarding the matter."

In their brief the delegates flatly stated that a 'protest' march by citizens would be made on the Provincial Building if a satisfactory answer were not received within six days.

There were three other members of the delegation speaking briefly. Sidney Murray, Central Bedoune, outlined fears of citizens regarding possible molestation of children if the liquor store were to be opened at this new location. Rev. D.L. Howlett, president of the Prince County Ministerial Association said the clergy of the area had withheld action because laymen were doing all necessary work. However, the association strongly supported the Athena Citizens Committee.

Rev. S. Grant Walls, president of the Summerside Ministerial Association, was in full accord with previous speakers and stated his organization offered complete support to them. The group was said to be representative of every school district involved through attendance of its children at Athena Regional High School.

Since the first move was made to place the liquor store in its new location a long series of protests have been voiced with every effort being made by the people to have government officials make a change. Following is the text of the brief:

Honorable M. A. Farmer, Acting Premier, and Honorable Gentlemen of the Executive Council.

When we last met with you as a Citizens Committee of Athena Regional High School Area, we sensed the concern on your part, that the committee did not actually represent the majority attitude of the people concerned. As you can see by the introductions to all the Districts as well as other concerned areas are represented here today.

We departed from our previous meeting assured by the Premier that the matter concerning the location of a liquor outlet on North Granville Street, would be resolved to the satisfaction of all. This has not been the case. Therefore, at the adjourned Annual Meeting of Athena Regional High School it was decided to circulate a Petition in the Districts, for signatures: with the following heading:

"We the undersigned endorse the action already taken in protesting of a retail liquor outlet in close proximity to the Educational, Recreational and Residential areas in North Granville Street. And further protest the dictatorial and undemocratic attitude displayed by the Government in dealing with this matter."

We insist that this outlet not be opened. It was further decided to challenge the Members of the Liquor Commission to attend a meeting in Athena Regional High School on August 28th to state their reasons

for locating the liquor outlet in this particular area, and interpret the procedures which were followed.

The meeting convened on that date with approximately 500 persons in attendance (press report) and due to the fact that no one was present to represent the Executive Council of the Government of P.E.I. or the Liquor Commission, it was unanimously agreed by a standing vote that a representative group of all the Districts served by Athena Regional High School, as well as Members of the Clergy, and the Allied Youth Post, seek an audience with the Executive Council to present the petitions with their signatures, and attempt to impress upon the minds of the Government of P.E.I. the determination of the ratepayers of this District to have the Government, and the Liquor Commission reverse their decision on this matter.

We fully realize some of the problems involved in a reversal of decision at this time. However, we remind the Government that the general public were not informed regarding the location of a liquor outlet in this area until commitments had been made. We also asked that a cessation of work on the building be ordered until this matter could be resolved to the satisfaction of all; and it has been partially or completely ignored. Therefore we are obliged even at this late date to insist again, that this outlet not be opened.

Gentlemen: we must inform you by the authority of the mass meeting of August 25th that if a satisfactory solution is not forwarded to this committee within six days, that a citizens march in protest, will be made to the Provincial Building.

We hope that this drastic action will not have to be taken, and that a solution can be arrived at through the democratic procedures followed thus far by the Citizens

Committee, and the Ratepayers of Athena Regional High School.

Two Are Fined For Speeding

Less than a dozen cases were on the docket before Justice of the Peace Albert Dennis in Traffic Court yesterday morning. A charge of speeding 60 mph in 40 mile zone saw C. William Farrell of Wilmot Valley assessed \$20 and costs while William H. Parker of Summerside and Joseph S. Diney Richards, North Bedoune, were each fined \$10 and costs on lesser speeding charges.

The following were each fined \$10 and costs or four days in jail: Elmer B. Clow, Cornwall, passing in a no passing zone; Maritime Construction Ltd., inefficient equipment; Joseph Gregory Doucette, North Rustico, failure to use a red flag on a load which was extending over four feet beyond the rear of a vehicle; Leo Joseph Hayes, Vernon River, splashing a pedestrian; Peter Pineau, North Rustico, inefficient equipment; Robert Gordon MacPherson, Summerside, failing to dim head lights; Winston Earl Anderson, Dunstaffnage, passing when unsafe to do so; David Gladstone O'Hanley, Charlottetown, illegal parking.
